YELLOW ROCKET

PRIMARY NOXIOUS WEED

"Yellow Rocket" is a weed that is spreading rapidly in the Province of Ontario, according to the Field Crops Branch of the Onta rio Dept of Agriculture. While this is not the season

, ly and when it was first natices here, only a few years ago, Rock et was not considered very seri ous, however, those farmers who have acquired this unwelcome weed are having their troubles to

If Yellow Rocket is to be cor trolled successfully, every pree aution must be taken. It first came to many of our farmers in Clover Seed. This year, it has been classed as a primary noxious weed un der the Canada Seeds Act, which now ensures that not even one Yellow Rocket seed may be pres ent in No. 1 Grade Clover Seed. Farmers using only No. 1 Grade seed are now protected.

Single plants and small patches should be pulled and burned. Early cutting of hay and- grass silage will keep it from seeding. In hay and pasture fields where only grasses are present Yellow Rocket can easily be killed by spraying with 8 oz., of 2, 4-D acid per acre, early in the growing sea-

Late Fall Application of MCP Eradication of Yellow Rocket with 2, 4-D presents a problem in sod fields containing Clovers as the required application of 2, 4-D will seriously damage the clover erop. The Dept. of Agriculture have this year recommended a late fall application of 6 oz. of MCP Amine in at least 20 gallons of water per acre. Good results may be secured if the spray is applied after two killing frosts and when the daytime temperature is above 45 degrees F.

An experiment using two new chemicals is being planned for a Halton county farm this Fall.






