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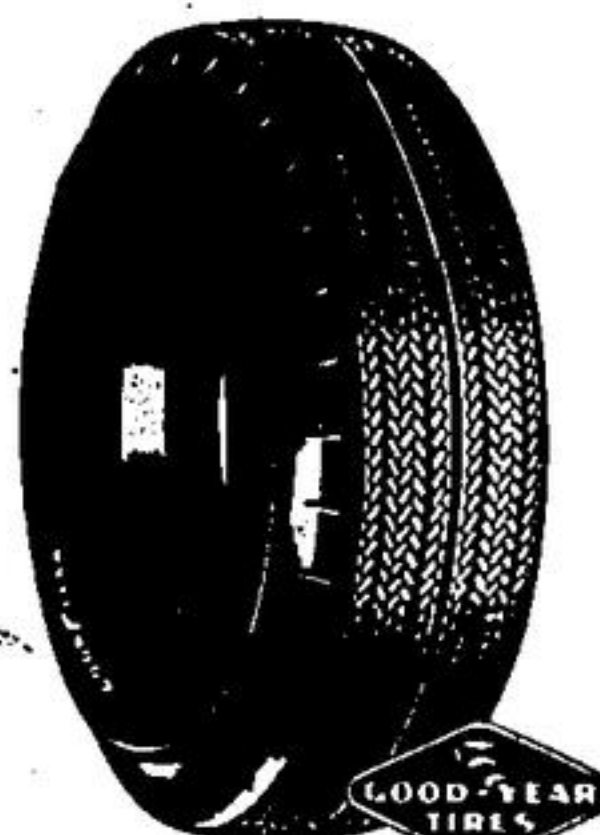
**MERCHANT WOMAN**

**1960 SHAPING UP AS  
CRITICAL HOG YEAR**

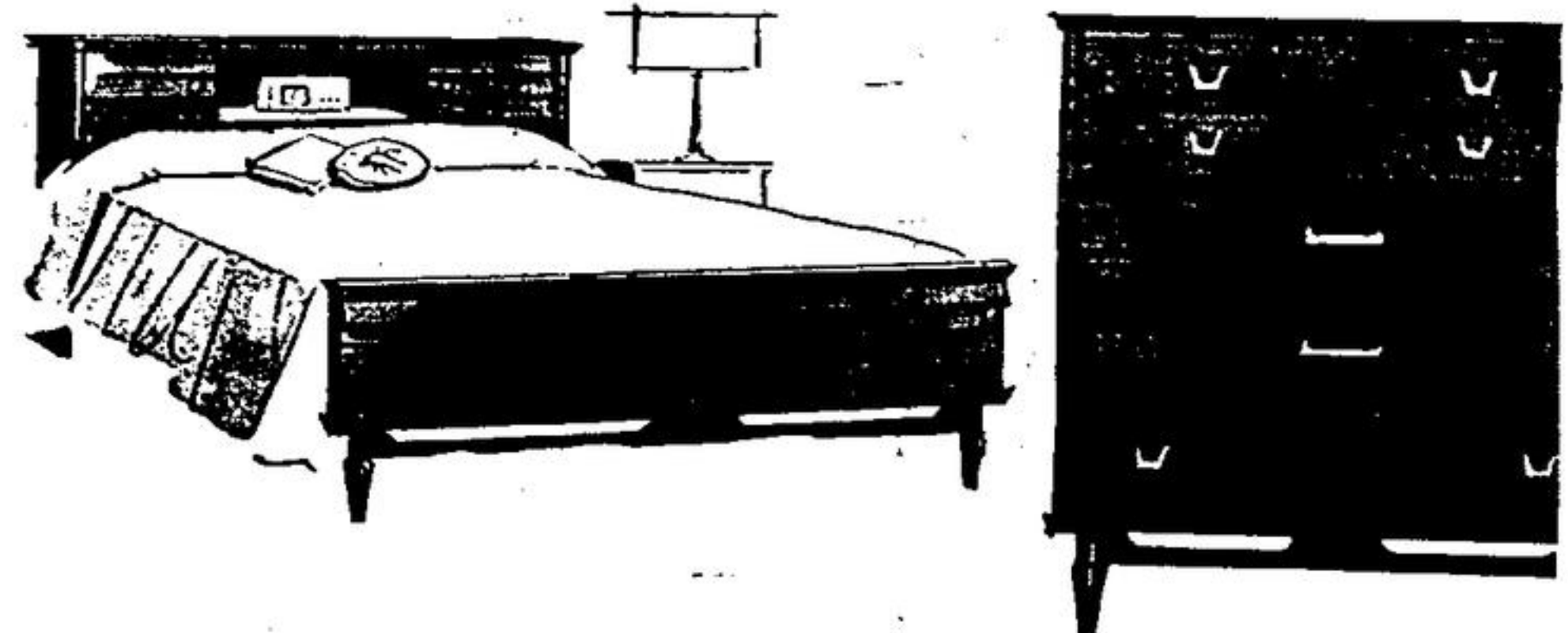
While support price programmes may change the picture slightly, nevertheless with the U.S. market our only major outlet for surplus bacon, it naturally follows that the U.S. pork market has a very definite relationship to that in Canada. A reliable U.S. authority states the situation developing for the coming year looks quite similar to that of 1955. In short the build up phase of the cycle is starting to show up. According to this authority, U.S. prices next spring will bottom out in March at about \$2 average price for the month in the range of \$15.50, with some weeks lower. April, they state, will see some recovery but it will not be rapid or of great magnitude — the month of May will, they add, enjoy a rising trend with June, the high

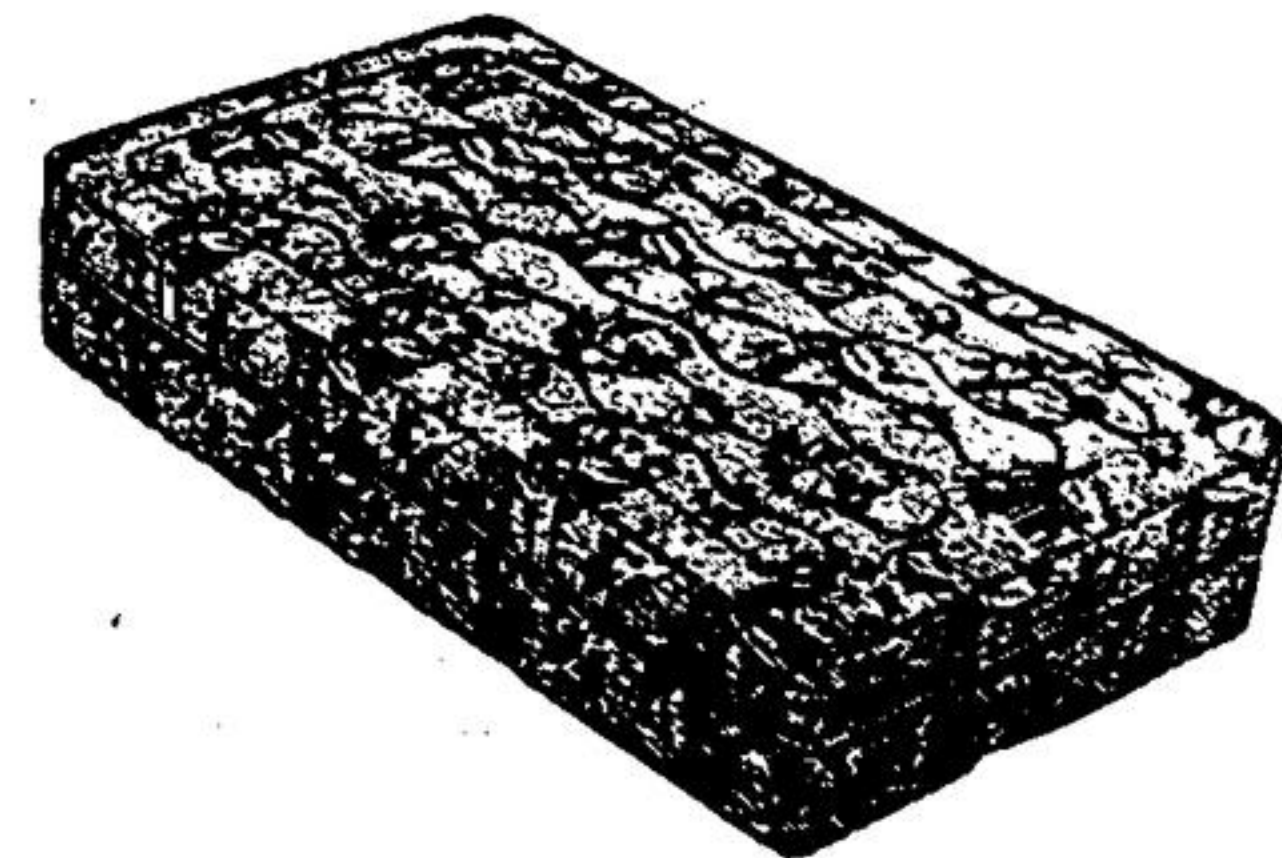
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summer month with prices ranging near \$18, and then in July, prices will weaken. The September Niche State Pig Crop Report gives production intentions for farrowings in December, January and February. Hogmen in these states reported they would farrow 2.01 million sows — an increase of 20 per cent above last year. The low price of 1959 in the U.S. will occur late, probably in December. These U.S. authorities are of the opinion that for the remainder of 1958, the profit picture becomes grayer, but they

add, it will not be tinged with black until late 1959. In other words, in their opinion, 1960 shapes up as the critical year for hogmen, and they recommend improving one's present operation, rather than expand now.
