

**MOTHER, CHILD ARE
INJURED IN ACCIDENT**

Two persons were injured, neither seriously, in a rear-end collision Friday on No. 7 Highway opposite Scott Motors, involving a

stake truck and a late model car. Injured were Gerry Halls, age 2 of Waterloo, who suffered a cut and bruised left eye and Mrs. Edith Halls who received a cut hand.

The accident occurred at about 4.40 p.m. when the 1956 Nash driven by Mr. John Wm. Halls collided with the rear of the stake truck, owned by the Maple Leaf Drum Company. The driver of the truck Zigmunt Dzionskiora of Toronto told police he jammed on his brakes when a car which had passed both the Halls car and his truck cut back in too soon.

Damage was estimated at \$400 to the Hall's car and \$50 to the truck. Cst. Ted Scott investigated.

Make Will, Save Money

Says Brampton Speaker

"Make your will and save money," stated Wilbert E. West, Q.C., Brampton solicitor. Mr. West addressed the Brampton Life Underwriters at their November meeting. The luncheon meeting was held in the banquet room of the Junction Diner, Brampton, November 13th.

Mr. West, introduced by J. R. Racine, Brampton, gave as his topic "The Value of Life Insurance in Estates." "You, as life underwriters can perform a public service by advising your contacts to draw up a will," continued the speaker. "At the same time the life insurance representative should explain the many benefits in a life insurance policy" suggested Mr. West. "Be careful not to appoint a minor as a beneficiary without a trustee" cautioned the solicitor.

Mr. West reported that life insurance had played an important role in many of the under \$50,000 estates his firm had handled.

The speaker concluded his remarks by touching on a few highlights of the new Canadian Estate Tax Act, which becomes effective on January 1st, 1959.

HISTORY ITEM SAYS MR. YOUNG TOWN FOUNDER

The November meeting of Silver-Wood W.I. was held at Mrs. Ernie Miller's home on Thursday evening with the president, Mrs. W. K. Norton in the chair, and with fifteen members present. Roll call was answered by naming a man in Canadian history and telling something about him. A letter was read from the school for retarded children in Milton asking to spread information on their growing need for money as the necessity for expansion becomes more urgent. The decision was made to make enquiries about buying a stove for the Stone School. Instead of exchanging gifts at the Christmas party, it was decided to each contribute a dollar to be sent to a family at Springhill whose husband and father was lost in the disaster. An invitation has been received from Norval W.I. to attend their extension course on "Program Planning on Dec. 3. Arrangements were made to finish out a layette for the children's shelter and to go on with others for the Unitarian service.

The program was taken over by the Historical Research convenor, Mrs. Douglas Peck, who called on Mrs. Fred Campbell for current events, and on Mrs. H. Marchington, for the motto "He that knoweth only his own generation remains a child." Mrs. Peck read excerpts clipped from the Herald in 1920 "Reminiscence of Georgetown" and written by Mr. C. W. Young whose father, he said was founder of the village proper although Mr. George Kennedy had built a sawmill on the Credit. His father located there in 1843, bringing his young bride in on foot after a "terrible journey" from near Oakville where he had lived after coming from Scotland as a young boy. They pitched their tent in the dense pine wilderness and in course of time built a homestead a general store and dwelling on the corner of Main and Mill Sts. As the writer left Georgetown in 1865, his memories of the very first years of the town were fascinating.
