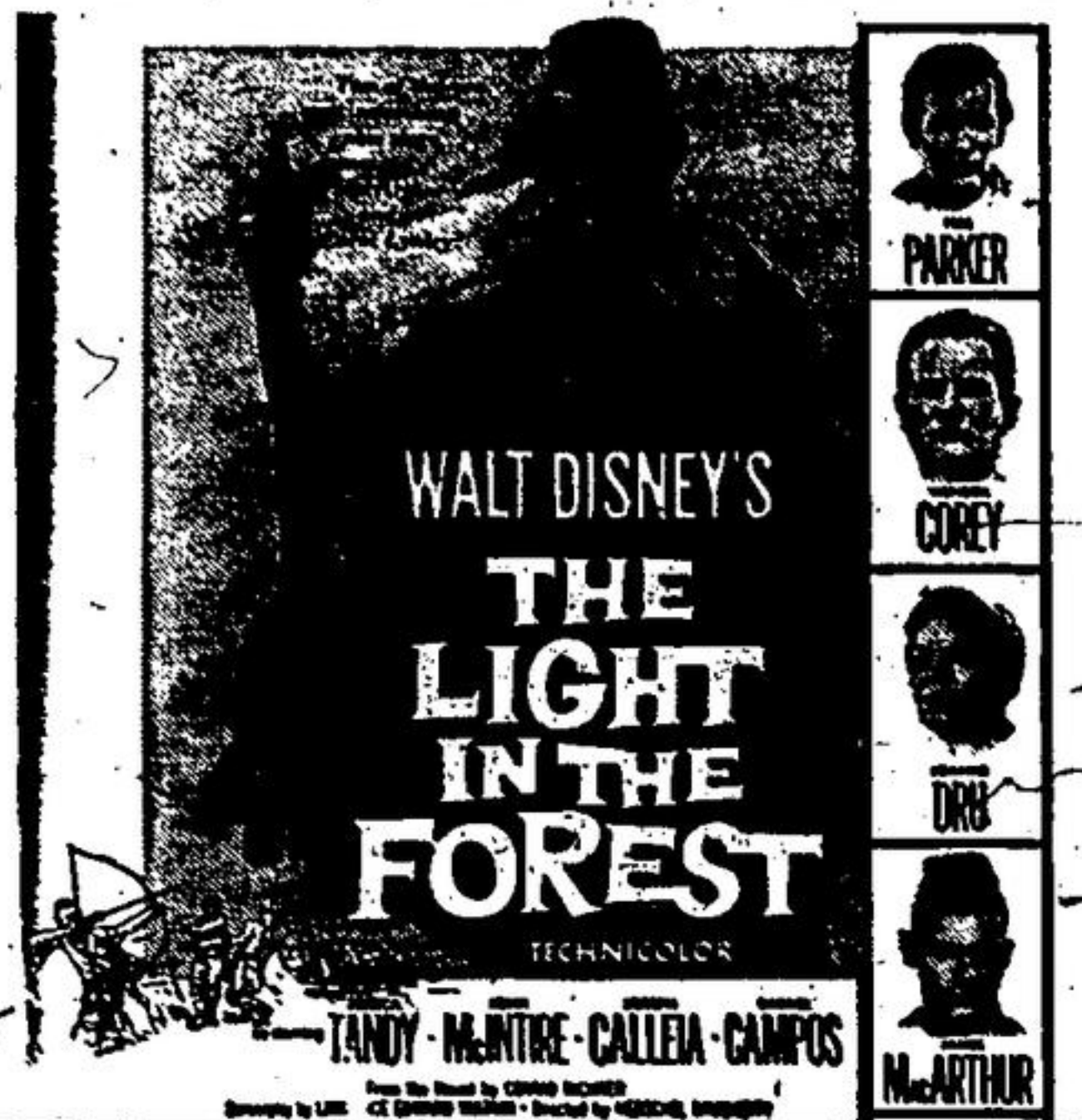

King Cleaners Dump Halton Homes Hockey

Foreseen, after last week's lame effort, to play doormat for the rest of the industrial hockey league this season, Co-Ops pulled the surprise of the afternoon on Sunday in dumping last year's champion Halton Homes 6 to 5 in the second game of an industrial double header at the arena.

Now playing under the tag of King's Cleaners, the club has added three new players and it paid off, especially in the third period Sunday when they came from behind to nip Halton Homes by one goal. Two goals by Mike George put the Homes into a 2-1 lead at the end of the first period, Mackenzie netting the lone King Cleaners tally. George from Baxter and Pomeroy from King had it 4-1 until Mackenzie chopped the lead to two with his second of the afternoon with less than two minutes to go.
