EXTENSION OF RED CROSS BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICE

Free blood transfusions will be provided for patients in Ontario hospitals, according to an announcement made by The Canadian Red Cross Society and the Ontario Hospital Services Commission. "This hospital extension of the Red Cross Blood Transfusion programme is something we have been hoping for many years," said J. H. Passmore, president of the Ontario Division of Red Cross. "When we first learned this news we notified the 100 branches in Ontario, and the response has been most stimulating." Mr. Passmore was referring to the announcement made by Marshal Stearns, chairman of the Red Cross National Executive and Monsignor John G. Fullerton, vice chairman of the Ontario Hospital Services Commission.

The announcement stated that the first move will be to extend the already existing service in Metropolitan Toronto to hospitals in communities along the north shore of Lake Ontario as far as Belleville, north from Toronto and west to Sault Ste. Marie. The extension of the service will be in operation by the end of this year.

The second phase will be completed as early as possible in 1959 and will include hospitals in Western Ontario and the area east from Belleville to the Ontario-Quebec border, north to Ottawa and Hull, and along the Ottawa river to North Bay.

Negotiations for suitable premises to house Red Cross blood transfusion service depots in London and in Ottawa are now being carried on by Red Cross and provincial and federal government officials.

Halton Team Twelfth In Livestock Judging

J. E. W. The inter county livestock judging competition was held in the Coliseum at the Royal Winter Fair on Thursday of last week. This competition is open to teams of three young men under the age of 26 years, who hadn't previously represented their county in this competition. The competitors judge three classes in dairy cattle, 3 classes in beef cattle, 3 classes of swine and one class of sheep; and give oral reasons for their placings on all ten classes.

The Jeffrey Bull memorial trophy which has been in annual competition since the first Royal in 1922, was won by the team representing Peterborough county; Oxford was second and North Simcoe third.

The Halton team composed of Wm. G. Marshall, Edward Segsworth and Don Taylor, placed 12th in the competition involving nineteen county teams.
