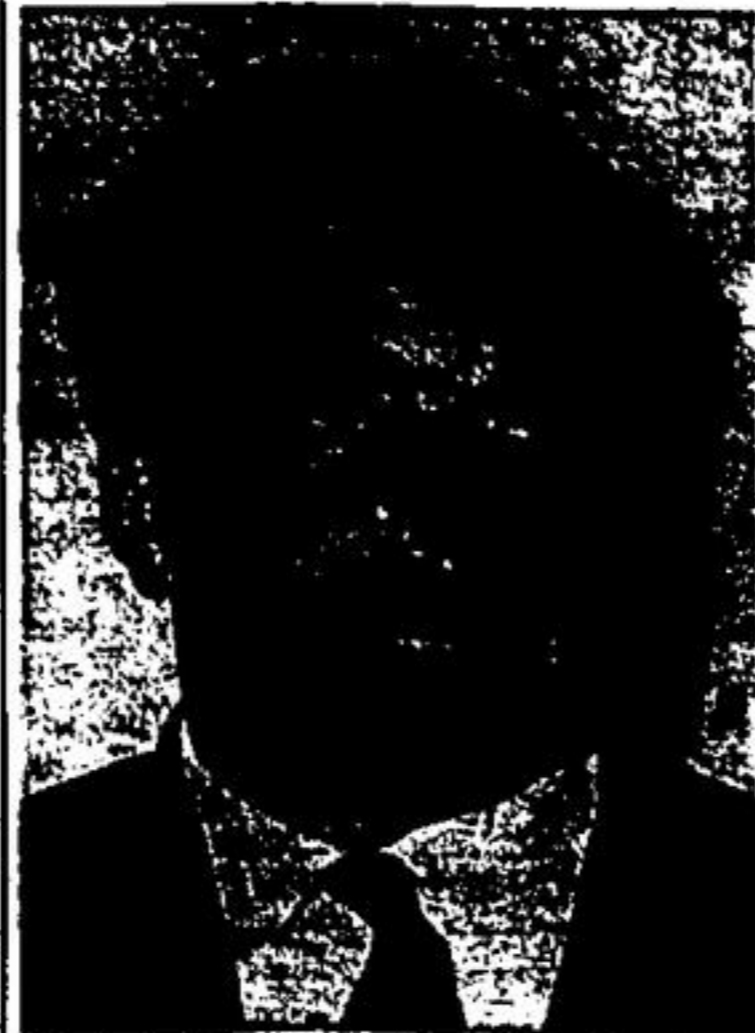

**Two War Veteran George Ferry Dies**  
A former resident of James St. George Ferry, died suddenly at his home in Dartmouth, Devon, in England, November 25th.  
Mr. and Mrs. Ferry emigrated to this country from England in 1930, settling in Georgetown where his brother, the late Harry Ferry, had preceded him. He was employed at Smith & Stone Ltd., leaving to join the Veterans' Guard of Canada with which he served throughout the war. He was a first war vet, serving with the Imperials. The family moved to Toronto in 1944, and after his army discharge, he was employed with the city public works department. Mr. and Mrs. Ferry moved back to the old country two years ago.  
He leaves his wife, Margaret Jane Pipe, three sons, George of Newmarket, Brian and Robert of Toronto; two grandchildren, and a sister, Miss Mary Ferry of Sunderland, England. Son Brian flew overseas to attend the funeral on Friday.

**Rescues Colt From Icy Death in Pool**

Glendon (Spike) Scott was hero of a thrilling rescue story at Limehouse when he plunged into an icy pool and saved a 3½ month old colt from drowning.

Mrs. A. J. Smethurst, a village resident, is credited with starting rescue operations when she noticed a mare, owned by Earl Scott, acting strangely in the field across from her home. She phoned Mr. Scott's sister, Mrs. Jack Crichton, who discovered that a 3½ month colt had tumbled into the swimming pool at the Scott property.

Mrs. Crichton quickly phoned her brother Glendon Scott who ran to the scene and realizing that the colt would soon perish in the icy water, plunged into the pool. He managed to get the colt's front legs on the edge of the pool, and with a huge effort boosted the heavy animal from the water. The colt was taken into the cellar, dried off and blanketed and later turned over to his mother, who, acting in nature's way, kept the young animal exercising until danger of it contracting pneumonia was over.
