MUST HAVE LIABILITY CERTIFICATE FOR 1959 PLATES

The Department of Transport, Motor Vehicles Division puts out a timely reminder about 1959 licence plates, and the liability insurance certificate which all drivers must have or be required to pay a \$5.00 fee.

The Dept. points out that this \$5.00 fee for uninsured drivers does not protect the uninsured owner against loss for damages caused by the operation of a motor vehicle owned or driven by him. This money is credited to the Unsatisfied Judgment Fund to pay claims for damages arising of accidents involving uninsured motor vehicles.

If you do not at present hold an insurance card, stating that you are insured for public liability, ask your insurance agent for one. Every insurance agent is being supplied with blank cards for this purpose. If your motor vehicle is at present insured for public liability and property damage, have your agent give you the proper liability insurance card before January 1st, 1959.

To obtain 1959 plates you must present with your application this card, containing the name of insured, address, year, make and type of car, insurance company of insured, and date insured to, and the name of the agent.

Licence plates on sale in all offices on Friday, January 2nd.

CLAIMS WATER POOL DANGER TO CHILDREN Nov. 28th, 1953

Dear Mr. Editor: This is a copy of a letter addressed to the town council, which I would appreciate your including in the Herald Mail Bag. Gentlemen:

Reference the accumulation of water on the Hydro property to the north of my property of the above address.

In the humble opinion of the writer of this letter the conditions and the water concerned represent a definite danger to small children as it attains a fair depth and considerable extent.

This opinion differs to that given via a report in the Georgetown Herald which report in fact emphasized the possible danger to sidewalks.

Maybe that this danger to children has not been considered or in the event that it has then more importance has been attached to the sidewalks.

As far as being an interested party is concerned, the undersigned has made a considerable sump on his property to take care of the excess flow. Excess is drained away from Hydro property due to my appreciation of conditions.

On one occasion after the recent heavy rains I dug channels and drained the majority of the water due to concern for the reason stated. It was necessary to drain the water on to the road and knowing council's concern for our bad roads, realize that I was risking their wrath and that I cannot repeat this operation and indeed feel that it should not be expected.
