facilities in repair, and a new location for the war memorial are two things which Cr. Fred Harrison hopes to see in 1959.

Declining his nomination for deputy reeve, Mr. Harrison said he did not wish to oppose Deputy Reeve Gray who has put such a good effort into his council work.

Though nothing had been budgeted, some \$3,000 had been spent on park improvements this year, which came under his jurisdiction, as property chairman. Next year, Mr. Harrison hopes there will be park money in the budget, particularly to do repair work on the grandstand which he termed a "disgrace."

"We must remember that we have other recreational properties besides the arena to spend money on," he said. "I also hope the arena can get the money to implement planned improvements and to make the building useable in summer months as well."

Things have changed since the horse and buggy days, he said, and what was a good location at one time for the cenotaph has ceased to be. Both the council and Legion branch have empowered him to seek a better location, and he hopes in the near future to have a suggestion which will be satisfactory.

Mayor? Not This Year

"I wish it were possible for me to run for mayor this year but I don't feel my own business would leave me enough time to do it justice," said Cr. Ern Hyde as he announced he would again be a candidate for council.

Mr. Hyde said he hoped that twelve months from now, conditions might be different and he could consider contending for the town's highest office.

"I opposed lowering the tax rate and my opinion was justified when you see a \$29,000 deficit, although there isn't much satisfaction in saying so," he said. He reiterated his stand that the town should pay its way wherever possible and issue debentures only for major expenditures.

"I've been criticized for my attitude to Delrex," he said, "but only when our industrial-residential ration is greatly improved will I have a more lenient attitude. Until that time, I'll be just as cautious in any town dealings with Delrex as I've been in the past."

Mr. Hyde was waterworks chairman this year, and reported that a planned system of automatic controls at the reservoir will pay its cost in one year. While chlorination had not been too popular with citizens, it has accomplished its purpose of ridding the water system of an iron fungus growth and chlorine taste will not be too noticeable in the water system in future, he promised.

Can't Be Influenced

"I have not and will not be influenced by pressure groups," said Cr. John Elliott as he stated his platform for reelection as a councillor.

Mr. Elliott said he thought he should have another year's experience before seeking the deputy's post. He has never missed a council or committee meeting, and takes council as serious business, he said. He feels with one year's service, he will be more experienced to face 1959 responsibilities.

"I'm an ordinary man and I don't know all the answers," he said, "but I'll work hard. Georgetown has a good future, and needs able bodied, experienced councillors to conduct town business."

As police chairman this year, Cr. Elliott reported for that department, to which two constables had been added due to a 25 per cent population increase. His committee also handles street lights, and he urged a continued program of replacing lights with the newer type.

"I didn't vote for a lower tax rate, either," he said. "My program is the best possible service for the lowest possible tax-dollar and no capital debt unless absolutely necessary, like schools."

Mr. Elliott said he had been pleased to see an industrial commission formed, and that Georgetown could not look to the Delrex firm entirely to attract new industry to town.

Hospital Progress

Another first term who seeks reelection, Cr. John Gunn, who is also chairman of the hospital board, said he anticipates a fund campaign, "relatively modest" in the spring.

Since the Ontario Hospital Services Commission okayed a hospital for town in January, a basic layout has been established, a site acquired just out of town limits adjoining the Park School property and the architect is now working on more detailed plans, he said.

Mr. Gunn's council work also involved the volunteer ambulance service which he said has done an outstanding job since its inception in 1957. More than 200 calls have been answered without one single complaint being received, he said. Purchase of a second ambulance this year has heightened the efficiency of the service.

While asking for reelection, he hopes even more, he said, that ratepayers will set a new record at the polls and show appreciation of their privilege of free choice in elections.

Heating With Hydro

Heating with hydro might be the coming thing, said Graham Farnell, hydro commission chairman who was acclaimed for another 2 year term.

Until recent hydro developments a competitive rate could not be offered, he said, but he forecast heating of houses and large buildings by hydro in the future. There has been no increase in hydro rates since 1954, he said, and if a different type of billing, now under discussion by Ontario Hydro should come, customers might have an even better rate in future.

Hydro is big business, he continued, running into \$350,000 yearly. He paid tribute to the good work of the superintendent and hydro crew and to the secretary.

"She doesn't know what arrears are, because we haven't got any," he said.

Expansion in hydro has been terrific, he said. Since November 3, 103 new services have been installed, bringing the total to 3050. The commission has handled expansion by employing outside construction crews for major work, and not increasing the local staff.

Chairman Retiring

Not seeking reelection after nine years as a public school trustee, chairman Ray Salter outlined work which the board has done this year and what faces it in 1959. Another board member, Cecil McNamara is also not a candidate for election.

Despite a 4-room addition at Harrison School and opening of the new Park school, Mr. Salter said additional classroom space is still facing the town. A portable classroom has been purchased and will probably come into use at Harrison school in January. Even with this, he sees the probability of staggering some classes at Harrison school in the spring if the current rate of growth in the east part of town continues.

An architect is working on plans for Georgetown's fifth public school, presently known as Webster St. school, he said. It will be located in the vicinity of the Sykes Tool plant.

Mr. Salter drew some interesting comparisons between 1950 when he first joined the board, and today. There were 11 classrooms then, and 49 today. Enrolment was 350. Today there are 1560 pupils plus more arriving every week. The school board's share of tax money, was \$19,500, today it is \$117,000.

The schools are excellently staffed, he feels, and Georgetown's fifty teachers can compare favourably with the staff of any other community. He mentioned the board secretary, for his hard work and capability.

Happy About Gymnasium

A resume of high school affairs followed, given by Ernest Forgrave, one of four local members of North Halton district board.

Mr. Forgrave explained how the board is composed of members from five municipalities, with Georgetown entitled to its fourth member because it has the highest public school enrolment. There is also
