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FARM NEWS

Milk Producers Elect
Hugh Beatty President

Addressing the annual meeting of District No. 12, Toronto Milk Producers at Stewarttown, Allen Lishman, president of Toronto Milk Producers stated there are in 1953 over 1,000 fewer shippers to the Toronto Milk Shed than there were eight years ago. On the other hand, with a 3 per cent increase in consumption of milk the 2960 shippers to Toronto in the past 12 months received payment for 132 million pounds more milk at secondary price than was the case in 1950. Eight years ago, 280 lbs. was the approximate average shipment — today the average shipment is 560 lbs. Since bulk tanks have gone in the average shipper has increased his shipments by 28 per cent. These figures are indicative of the trend towards fewer and larger shippers.

President, Lishman also presented comparative figures for the years 1949 and 1957, to show the share of the consumer's dollar being received by the various commodity groups. In the case of hogs he producer now receives 48 cents instead of 62c as he did eight years ago. The wheat producer has to be content with 34c instead of 49c, the egg producer's share of the consumer's dollar has in the same 8 year period dropped from 82c to 69c — the beef producer is now receiving 54c instead of the 64c that he did in 1949. In the case of fluid milk, the milk shipper is receiving 52.2 cents instead of 56c as he did in 1949. Credit for this narrower reduction suffered by the fluid milk shipper, stated Mr. Lishman, largely goes to the policy of formula pricing adopted a few years ago. Equally interesting messages were brought by secretary manager John W. Pawley of the Toronto Association, fieldmen Wm. McCorquodale and Howard Hooper; manager Harrison of the Toronto Co-Op Surplus Milk Plant, and district director Kyle Bingham.

It was a very much worthwhile programme presided over by vice president Hugh Beatty and to secretary John M. Bird goes a bouquet for the excellent leadership which he continues to render the Toronto fluid milk shippers of Halton and South Wellington. The newly elected board of directors follows:
