Every Businessman Can Be Free Enterprise Evangelist

Every Canadian businessman should appoint himself "an evangelist for private enterprise" and tell Canadians the real basis for our present high standard of living, Stuart Armour, economic adviser to the Steel Company of Canada, told the Oakville - Trafalgar branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

"Government can provide nothing for one set of petitioners except at the expense of others who have created and sold the products by which society exists," he said. But this fact will not be generally realized until the private enterprise story is "adequately told."

Mr. Armour said the message bearer should not confine his efforts to his own circle of friends and acquaintances. "There are scores of organizations all over this province on the lookout for speakers," he continued. "Businessmen should make it their business to fill this want."

Citing women's organizations, church men's clubs, parent-teacher associations and service clubs as targets for future addresses, he said, "instead of holding meetings like this one, we businessmen should be out driving home to our fellow Canadians some of the merits of private enterprise."

Unless businessmen can convince people this without private enterprise personal freedom will perish. I do not feel the bright projections as to our future in Canada have much chance of becoming realities, he added.

"It has long been my contention that since ours is a business society, the businessman occupies a sort of trustee relationship towards this Canada of ours," Mr. Armour continued. "If that be true then, in my view, we have been pretty unfaithful trustees."

He said that already, as a result of public demands against government, Canadians have largely priced themselves out of foreign markets.

"Now we stand in very real danger of finding ourselves unable to sell to Canadian," he declared. Since Canada could not maintain her present population without a flourishing manufacturing industry, he warned the decline of both would see the end of our high standard of living.

The "demonstrated tax paying ability of manufacturing" should further the esteem of government and people, he said. But, despite the fact that Canadian manufacturers contributed over \$204.1 million more income tax in 1955 than all other segments of Canadian business combined. "It would almost seem by the treatment accorded to manufacturing in this country that the majority of Canadians do not like enjoying the

second highest living standard in the world."

Mr. Armour added that manufacturers also paid most of the \$1,028 in excise taxes and the \$301 million in sales tax collected in 1955, the last year detailed taxation statistics are available.

Expect 2000 Children To View Santa Parade

Two thousands bags of candy have been put away by the Lions Club for the Santa Claus parade on Saturday 41 was reported by parade chairman Tom Reed at the regular dinner meeting in the Legion Hall on Tuesday, December 2. Mr. Reed announced that plans were progressing well for the gala procession expected to be the biggest and best of the club's 27 successive parades. A large number of colourful floats will travel the parade route from Delrex to the Main Street four corners.

The only charter member of the club, Harold McClure, introduced the guest speaker for the evening, Lion Frank Bartlett of Hamilton Central Lions, who is presently a member of the board of governors. He is also the immediate past president of the Canadian Association of Lions Club.

He spoke on Lionism at other levels than the ordinary club member, speaking from his experience as Canadian president, and also outlined the growth of Lionism in Canada since the forming of the first Canadian Club at Windsor in 1921 and from there to the forming of the Canadian Association in 1928. Today there are well over 600 Lions Clubs in Canada.

He stressed the work of the Lions in serving humanity in general without thought of repayment and outlined the origin and meaning of the club's slogan "We Serve." He remarked that membership in Lionism teaches men to work together harmoniously and in doing this gain more self confidence. "Defeat in running for office should not disappoint us but help us to gain more experience for future leadership," he said.

In closing he complimented the club on their fine work and growth of the past few years and wished them every success in the future remarking that his first address after joining Lionism in 1946 was made at a meeting of the Georgetown club and since that time has gained many friends here.

He was thanked for his address by Dick Licata who is second only to Lion Harold McClure in membership years. Lion president Dick Miller also expressed his personal thanks for a fine address.

Two staunch Hamilton Tiger Cat fans Lions Ivan Crabtree and Jim Robertson were extended the sympathy of the club over their recent bereavement, i.e. the Blue Bomber attack on the Hamilton Tiger Cats in Vancouver on Grey Cup day.

A very humorous "funeral ceremony" with six club members acting as pallbearers exemplified the club's grief. A head table for the two staunch mourners was suitably decorated in yellow and black and a stuffed "tabby" separated the pair.

After the solemn ceremony they both thanked the club for their sympathy and kind words.

Jack Gunning, chairman of the local Lions public speaking contest outlined the dates of the club, zone and region contests. The club intends to enter the contest again this year.

The Christmas party for children of club members, is to be held in the Arena Rose Room on Sunday, December 21st, with full details to be given later by chairman Stan Wade.
