**Korzack Home in Glen Williams
Is Ravaged by Fire on Sunday**

A Glen Williams family was left homeless late Sunday night when fire gutted their large brick two storey house located beside Glen Williams public school. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Korzack, their two daughters Karen and Nancy, and son Neil, were in Toronto when the flames, which originated in the basement, spread quickly to the attic claiming everything within the four brick walls.

An addition at the rear of the house containing a bedroom and kitchen, escaped the flames but suffered water damage. The insurance adjuster listed it as a total loss.

The fire broke out at about 8.40 and was first noticed by a passing motorist who could see flames through the cellar window. He stopped his car and alerted the neighbouring home of Bev Moody who turned in the alarm.

Using booster lines to pump water from the nearby river, firemen had little trouble in killing the basement blaze but some of the flames were shielded by a stair well and clothes chute and quickly carried disaster to the rest of the house. The flames in the clothes chute traveled directly to the upstairs where the damage first started to mount.

The family's pet dog died in the fire when overcome by the heavy smoke. When firemen entered the house they found it lifeless on the chesterfield where it had apparently been sleeping. Besides furniture and clothing a number of Christmas boxes were also lost.

The brigade stayed until 3 a.m. battling the blaze and had just finished the job when their two booster lines and one smaller line were rendered useless by the sub-zero temperature. They were called back to the scene of the fire twice through the night to douse minor flareups.

Firemen were grateful to the many Glen residents who opened their houses and others who provided coffee and sandwiches as well as changes of socks and gloves for the brigade.

One of the firemen Wilfred, 'Babe' Breen, who was directing traffic on the ninth line informed the Korzacks of their loss when they returned. Mr. Korzack drove up beside the brigade member at the intersection and inquired of the excitement when he noticed the horde of cars parked near his home.

Glen neighbours and friends in town have generously rallied to aid the family with donations of cash and useful articles, which with the insurance payments, will help the family become re-established in the house which Mr. Korzack is hoping to rebuild.
