Seek Transportation For Eastern School Children

A delegation of ratepayers from the homes in the Sykes, Tool Corporation area queried board members as the possibility of transportation for children from that area, on Wednesday, December 3rd when the public school board held their regular monthly meeting at Harrison School.

The delegation stated that it was not the distance from school that prompted their action but the fact that during the winter months the children had to walk home in darkness through areas which are not yet built up. The recent rabid fox scare added to their concern for the youngsters, particularly those of kindergarten and primary grade age.

The board agreed to seek information regarding a possible transportation system.

Two more teachers were engaged by the board at the meeting expanding the total staff to fifty-two. Mrs. Vera Darcie of Glen Wil-

lains and Mrs. Ruby Pedwell of Erin will commence duties at the Harrison Public School on January 1st.

The board set January 7th as the date for the inaugural meeting of the 1959 board. Two veteran members, chairman Ray Salter and Cec McNamara will not contest their seats this year.
