## WHAT COUNCIL DID

### New Sewage Plant Planned For Spring Operation in 1960

Georgetown's new sewage disposal plant will be in operation in the spring of 1960, if plans materialize according to the schedule of Proctor and Redfern, consulting engineers.

G. U. Proctor outlined progress to date when he reported to council on Monday, and said he expects to call for tenders for the trunk sewer early in the new year. Tenders for the disposal plant will be called later in the spring, he said and it will take approximately a year from then to complete the whole project.

A definite site for the disposal plant has not been chosen, he said. Two are being considered, one on each side of the river and soil testing is to start this week to determine which is best.

Questioned about whether a proposed conservation dam on the 9th line will boost estimated costs of the new sewage plant Mr. Proctor said it would, but that he feels the figure will still be well within the estimates.

Cr. Alfred Sykes wanted to know if the firm is acting independently in determining a site for the plant, or if the Delrex firm is being consulted. Mr. Proctor replied that no personalities will be involved in any recommendation which his firm makes. The south side of the river has the advantage of higher land, he said, but homes look down on it, while the north side is treed and would better hide the plant from public view.

Cr. Fred Harrison thought land covered in the town - Delrex agreement should be decided to the town, otherwise council is talking about putting a building on land which is not owned by the town.

Reeve Sargent said it is to the town's advantage not to own the land at present, as taxes are being collected on it, and until a definite location is decided, the town would not know what it wants.

Consulted by the building inspector about a request for a house permit from W. H. Carr, council told him nothing can be done at present because the building lot is in a part of Delrex not yet released for house building.

Cr. Harrison said he had heard no report by the Board of Parks management at nomination meeting, and that he thought a board spending almost \$10,000 of tax money should make such a report either at that meeting, or to council.

He was told by the mayor that council could ask this, but that the board's only requirement is to have its books audited and a statement printed in the auditor's report. The meeting which follows nominations has no official status, he said, and no board is required to report at it.

After dinner the children said recitations, closing by singing away in a song, and prayer by Rev. Fred. Sally Binsdale thanked the ladies for the lovely dinner.

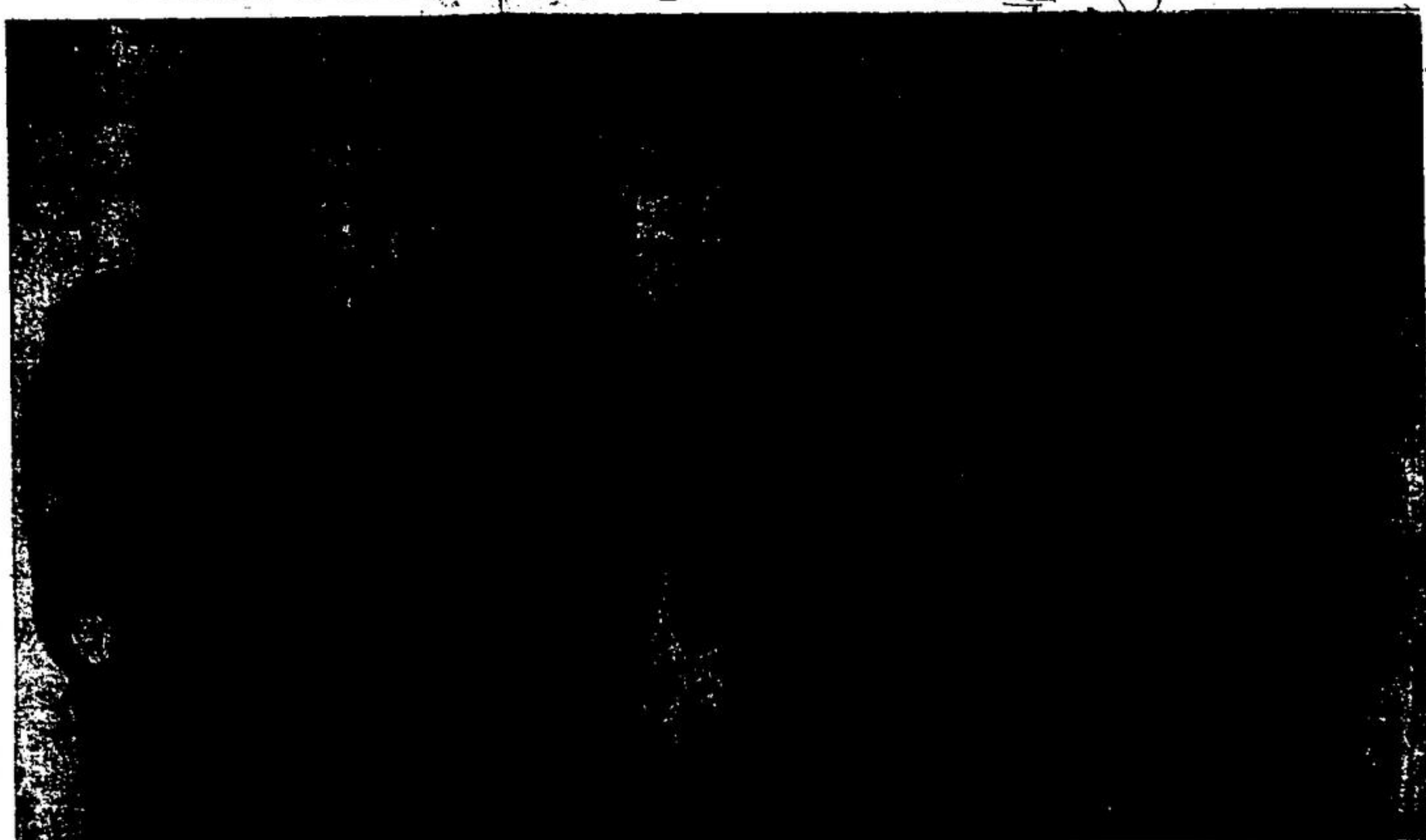
## BUSINESS WOMEN'S CLUB HAS A CHRISTMAS PARTY

## Police Force Campaign for Fatality Free 1958



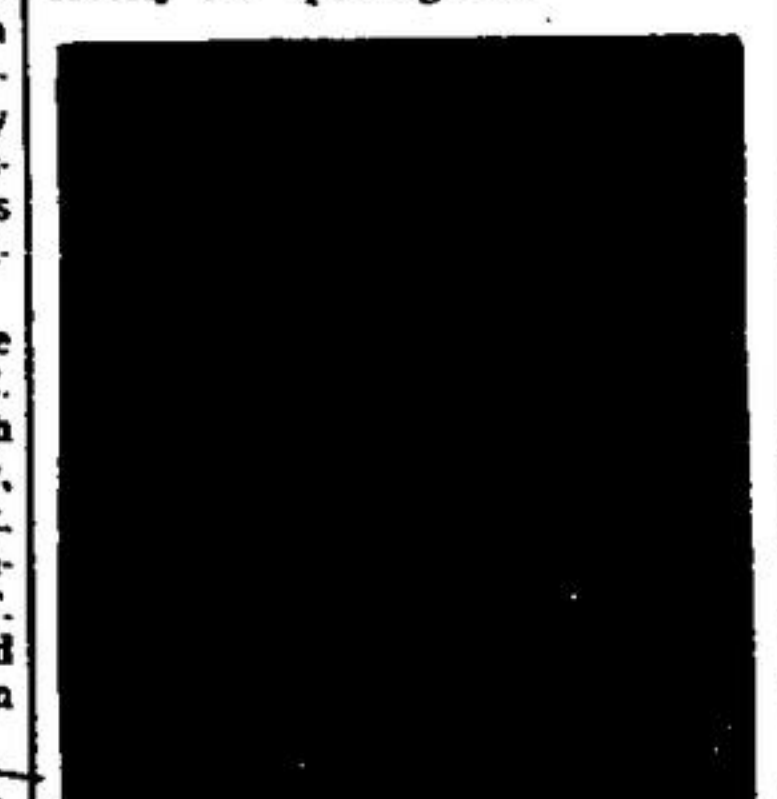
