Poor Road Conditions Many Accidents Occur

Mike Marko, 1 Elm Street, suffered minor injuries to his right hand in a two car collision on Queen Street on Thursday, Dec. 18. Mr. Marko was driving north on Queen when his car, a 1948 Chrysler, was involved in collision with another northbound car, a 1965 Ford, driven by Olive Logan, of 8 Queen Street, at 1:50 p.m.

Miss Logan was making a right turn into her driveway when the accident occurred. Total damage was estimated at \$85 by Cst. Frank Dennis who investigated.

At 10:55 the same morning Cpl. Bilsborrow investigated a minor smash on the parking lot in front of Georgetown Dairy where a 1967 Ford sedan owned by Albert Richard Martin of 6 Vaughan Road, Toronto, was damaged to the extent of approximately \$50.

Mr. Martin parked his car in front of the dairy while inside briefly and returned to find a dent in the left rear door. A streak of red paint offered the only clue to the hit and run vehicle.

A rear end collision occurred on Guelph St. opposite Sykes Tool Corp. on Friday, Dec. 19th involving cars driven by Edward Hasenpflug of 31 John St. E. and Miss Hope Keenan of 39 Edith St. Mrs. Keenan was attempting to make a right turn into Sykes Tool when the accident happened. Bad weather conditions were blamed as the cause of the mishap which resulted in damage totalling \$35. It was reported at 8:55 a.m.

Extremely poor road conditions were also responsible for a collision at the intersection of Guelph St. and Sinclair Ave. at 9 a.m. on Friday, where a car driven by Philip Zambra of 3 Torbalton Dr., Rexdale and a Bell Telephone truck driven by Walter Revis Bennett, 59 Main St. were in collision.

Both vehicles were westbound on the highway and the Zambra car was making a left turn at the time. Approximately \$225 damage resulted from the accident investigated by Cpl. Bilsborrow.
