Christmas Parties Delight Residents at Halton Manor

The lovely Christmas music that forms so large a part of the Christmas season at Halton Manor began on Monday evening, December 8th, when twenty five ladies and gentlemen belonging to the South Peel choral society presented their annual Christmas concert for the residents. Mr. Jerry Salmers, the leader of the choir, not only performed his duties as leader in his usual expert fashion but also acted as chairman for the evening. It was a special honour to welcome to the Manor, Brojeswar Roy, a native of Calcutta, India, who is in Canada to study methods used in the manufacture and merchandising of rubber. All the ladies of the choir wore very pretty blue evening gowns, while the men wore white jackets and dark trousers. The first item in the program consisted of a number of anecdotes and the reciting of the words of comic songs by Mr. Bert Tyler. This put the audience in a gay mood for the musical numbers that followed. The choir sang a great variety of musical numbers which contained Christmas carols, sacred songs, and secular songs. In the carol, "O Holy Night" Mrs. B. Pritchard sang a lovely solo part. Mrs. J. Coates was the very capable accompanist for all the musical numbers on the program. She also played several piano solos which included a "White Christmas" and "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes." Four of the men singers exchanged their white jackets for striped barber's jackets and "grew" hand-bar moustaches for the presentation of several "barber shop songs." The Louise Brothers of Port Credit delighted the audience with their rendition of country dance numbers on their violins. A mixed quartette dressed in old fashioned costumes sang old ballads of a half a century ago. During the last choral selection, Santa Claus, dressed in his traditional red and white suit and generously bedecked with a white beard, entered the room. He presented to Mr. and Mrs. John Coldwell, of Cooksville, a couple who have been married recently, and to Norman Viggers and Muriel Thompson, special gifts. Mr. Viggers had assisted in the musical part of the program by playing the piano. The serving of tea and cookies ended this most enjoyable evening.

The musical events of the Christmas season, that had begun so auspiciously on Monday, Dec. 8th, were continued on Friday afternoon, Dec. 12, when eighteen girls from Cedarvale School at Georgetown presented a musical program for the residents. Mr. Stan Hall, MPP for Halton County, had been so very kind as to arrange the transportation for the girls. The residents are grateful to Mr. Hall and to several other gentlemen for using their cars in this respect. Mr. Hall introduced the girls to their Manor audience and he also introduced the superintendent of the school, Mrs. Houston; the girls' teacher, Mrs. T. Margeson, and several other members of the staff. The program was given entirely by the girls who were led in very unassuming but expert fashion by their teacher, Mrs. Margeson. The program was the Christmas story in prose and poetry and included the responsive reading of chapter 2 of St. Luke's gospel, special Christmas recitations of prose and poetry and lovely Christmas carols. The musical accompaniments were played by Mr. B. Shrubsole. After this inspiring and appealing program, which closed with a Christmas prayer recited by all the girls in unison, the girls and the residents sang several familiar carols together. Mrs. Houston brought gracious Christmas greetings from the staff and girls of Cedarvale school when she addressed a personal message to the residents. The hearty applause for the visitors that followed a speech of thanks by Muriel Thompson showed how sincerely these greetings were appreciated. The girls presented special Christmas stockings filled with fruit and candy to all the residents. Refreshments of soft drinks and cookies were then served to bring a thoroughly delightful visit with these wholesome young girls and their talented teachers to a close.

Saturday afternoon, Dec. 13th was a red letter day in the calendar of the residents of Halton Manor for at that time they were taken on their annual bus ride thru the kindness of Oakville Knights of Columbus and to Holy Rosary separate school for refreshments served by the Catholic Women's League of Milton. Promptly at two o'clock two chartered buses arrived at the Manor for the residents. With them were two representatives of Oakville Knights of Columbus in the persons of Mr. Roy White and Mr. Jack Markey. The buses, driven by very careful drivers, took the residents to Rockwood and back. Upon arriving in Milton again, the buses stopped at Holy Rosary separate school where

a delicious and bountiful supper of sandwiches, cake, cookies, tea and coffee was served by the ladies of the Catholic Women's League with Mrs. McCarron as convener. Before refreshments were served, however, the residents enjoyed an interesting program. The lovely carol "Gloria in Excelsis Deo" and four other carols were sung by a number of ladies belonging to the Burnamthorpe Home and School choir with their talented leader, Mrs. E. Feast conducting and Mrs. A. Savage at the piano. The ladies of the choir were dressed alike in very smart royal blue and white costumes with red corsages. A very appealing portion of the program followed with Sister Emmanuella at the piano, a group of small boys and girls gave recitation and sang songs. The songs were Christmas songs and were sung very sweetly. Two examples of the very appealing recitations were "Christopher Robin" in saying his prayers and "Three Little Kittens." A miniature Santa Claus in the person of Mary Rose Kelly presented Christmas gifts to the residents. Each woman resident and each man resident received a very attractive handkerchief in a very pretty Christmas wrapped box. All in all, from every point of view, it was a most delightful afternoon and the generosity of the Knights and the hospitality of the Catholic Women's League are deeply appreciated.

With Christmas only ten days away, a very timely and inspiring sermon was delivered by Rev. E. Orsborn, minister of Knox Presbyterian Church, Milton, in the chapel on Sunday afternoon, Dec. 14th. After reading the story of the first Christmas as written in the second chapter of St. Luke's gospel, Mr. Orsborn chose part of verse 15 as his text. The text contained the words "Let us now go even unto Bethlehem." Once every twelve months, Mr. Orsborn said, the gaze of the whole Christian world turns towards Bethlehem. It is a very happy season and all of us should go in thought to Bethlehem and learn the reason for the greetings and gifts of this same season, and above all the reason for the urged to which we have given the name "The Christmas Spirit." Mr. Orsborn then asked the question: "Why couldn't the Christmas season last all year through?" He explained that when we do things for others we carry on the Christmas spirit the whole year long. Mrs. Locke was at the piano for the service and led in the singing of the Christmas carols that were in accord with Mr. Orsborn's message.
