**Varied Holiday Entertainment Pleases Halton Manor Residents**

On Monday afternoon, Dec. 15, eight ladies belonging to group 7 of St. John's United Church in Oakville conducted a very enjoyable informal party for the residents of the Manor. The president of the group, Mrs. M. Luby was one of the ladies who came. The program opened with the playing of two German folk songs by Mrs. E. Radley on her accordion. This was followed by the singing of Christmas carols by the visitors and residents in unison, with Mrs. R. Thomas leading in the singing and Mrs. Radley playing the accompaniments on her accordion. During the refreshment hour that followed, old friendships formed a year ago, when this same group had visited the Manor were renewed and new friendships formed. The refreshments, sandwiches, small cakes and ginger-ale all donated and served by the visitors were very delicious. During the refreshment hour a gift of costume jewellery was presented to each woman resident and a box of candy to each non-resident. Small bags of home-made fudge were also presented to each resident. Although few in number, these eight ladies were outstanding in hospitality and left many pleasant memories behind them.

An appealing little play, based on the Nativity of Our Lord, was enjoyed by the residents on Monday night, December 15th, when Rev. D. A. Powell, rector of Grace Anglican Church, Milton, brought fourteen young girls, belonging to the Girls' Junior Auxiliary of his church to the Manor. Three leaders came with the girls, Mrs. Ireland Hilson, Mrs. Ray Waters and Mrs. J. Thorples. These three ladies had trained the girls for the presentation of this inspiring little play. Mrs. Waters was at the piano for the evening and also played Christmas selections while the audience was assembling. The play depicted the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem, the child in the manger, the coming of the shepherds and the wise men, and all the other aspects of the First Christmas. It was illustrated by means of the singing of familiar Christmas carols, and the whole effect was lovely. A beautiful azalea plant was presented to Mrs.

Stan Allen as a gift to the residents by Betty Ann Parton. Mrs. Allen thanked the girls and their leaders for this lovely gift and promised them that it would have a prominent place in the dining room. She also thanked the girls for the very enjoyable play that they had presented. The girls then assisted Mrs. Allen in serving cookies that they had donated and soft drinks to the audience.

At supper time on Wednesday, Dec. 17th, twenty four little girls belonging to the 3rd Brownie Pack of Milton, accompanied by their leaders, Mrs. G. Strain and Mrs. Ida Reed visited residents in the dining room. The girls looked very attractive in their Brownie suits and berets. The girls presented small practical gifts to the residents, such as notepaper, combs and toiletries. This friendly visit and the presentation of these timely gifts by these generous young girls and their gracious leaders are deeply appreciated.

Close to forty bandmen and bandswomen belonging to the Burlington concert band played a wonderful band concert at the Manor on Thursday night, Dec. 18th. The bandmen and bandswomen looked very smart in their wine and black uniforms. The band was conducted in his usual very talented fashion by Mr. Elgin Corlett. Between the opening number "O Canada" and the closing number "The Queen," the band played a very generous number of selections that varied widely in character and proved the band's versatility. Grand opera was represented by the March from Wagner's Tannhauser while light classical music was represented by the Overture to Die Fledermans by Strauss. Music by such modern composers as Leroy Anderson and Peter De Rose also had its place on the program.

The music for this occasion was provided by a grant from the Recording Industries with the cooperation of Local 293 of the American Federation of Musicians.

Community singing of Christmas carols was conducted in a unique way when some of the bandmen laid aside their instruments and led the singing while the remainder played the accompaniments.

A large number of the First Strathcona Pack of Cubs of Burlington were present and during an interval in the program Cub Garry Morrison, acting on their behalf, presented a very pretty blue budgie to Mr. Wm. Hughes, representing the residents. The Cubs had pooled their savings and allowances in order to present this generous gift to the Manor, a gift that will give pleasure all year through. At the close of the concert, tea and cookies were served to all present.


A reverent and inspiring candle-lighting ceremony based on the Nativity was presented on Friday night, Dec. 19th, by fourteen ladies belong to the Evening Auxiliary of St. Paul's United Church, Milton.
