Secure Outstanding Speakers Farm Groups Annual Meetings

The Jersey annual which takes the form of a banquet is scheduled for the Stewartrtown Hall on Tuesday, January 13th. Here the highlight is to be an illustrated address by John F. Clark, of the Horticultural Societies Branch of the Ontario Horticultural Societies branch of the Dept. of Agriculture, Toronto.
