### Alert Policeman Averts Fire at Shopping Plaza

Had a police officer not been patrolling the area at the time Georgetown's partially built Delrex Shopping Plaza could have been reduced to smouldering ashes New Year's morning.

Cpl. Jim Bilsborrow was checking the area in the police cruiser when he noticed flames licking from the roof of the structure. He notified the fire brigade who promptly doused the flames before any damage could be done. The blaze was still confined to a pile of tar on the roof of the plaza when they arrived, but had it started to spread, it would have spread rapidly, probably razing the entire building.

Hours earlier firemen were summoned to an imaginary blaze at Limehouse by a false alarm, apparently turned in by a prankster who is unaware of the trouble and danger encountered by the brigade members every time they race to answer a fire call, especially during winter when road conditions are usually anything but safe. A speeding fire truck striking an icy patch of road could spell death to its firefighting passengers and a deliberate false alarm puts the lives of twenty-four men at hazard.

Anyone turning in such a call can be heavily fined, Fire Chief Jack Harlow warns.

### Later Model Replaces Car Abandoned Here

According to police, car thieves who abandoned a stolen vehicle on Texway Drive, early Tuesday morning were also responsible for the theft of a late model car from the driveway of contractor Harold Fobert, 82 Rexway. The Fobert car, a 1957 Monarch was taken from its parking spot sometime between 2:30 and 4:00 a.m. Tuesday and when Cst. R. D. Whitson investigated he discovered the abandoned 1951 Meteor not far away.

A phone call to the licence registration bureau in Toronto by chief Roy Haley identified the car as belonging to a Robert J. Coles of Downsview. However Toronto police admitted that they had had no notification of the theft. Chief Haley contacted the owner's wife at Downsview, who confirmed that her husband's car had been stolen. Cst. Whitson is handling the investigation of the Fobert theft.
