CAR STOLEN LOCALLY FOUND IN COOKSVILLE

A car stolen from the driveway of Harold Robert, 82 Rexway Dr. was recovered last Tuesday morning in Cooksville by Toronto Township police.

The car a 1957 Monarch was taken early on the morning of Jan. 6th and an abandoned 1951 Meteor was discovered near there.

The era of the crank telephone ended in Victoria and vicinity early Sunday morning, Jan. 11, when a new common-battery telephone system went into service.

Everything was pre-arranged, so that the old magneto equipment was taken out of operation, and the new placed in service in a few minutes. Technicians had spent weeks installing a new switchboard and associated equipment in the exchange building at Snellgrove. By snipping some wires to the old switchboard and removing "busy plugs" (insulators) in the new board, the Bell men quickly made the transition.

Another important change that took place at the same time as the cutover was a reduction in the number of parties sharing lines. This improvement was made possible because during recent weeks the network of cables and wires serving the exchange area had been extended and rebuilt. Some

Two new porches were erected at the main doors of the church of cut stone with English railing. New eavestroughing was installed, the building was pointed and the exterior painted. Note was made of the fine appearance the building presented to any passerby. Several members of the congregation commended the Board for their diligence during the past year. The question of a new organ was raised and the members felt they were not ready as yet to deal with the installation of a new instrument. It was referred to the next annual meeting. The leader of the Sunshine Mission Band, Mrs. Norman Icam, reported a good year for the group and thanks to those who had cooperated with her in the labour. Mrs. Icam also reported as treasurer of the Home Help group stating that a total of \$594.24 had been raised of which \$388.00 went to missions.

Mrs. George H. Leslie reported for the Women's Missionary Society by commenting on the financial report which showed a slight increase over the previous year. A total of \$706.71 was raised by the WMS, of which \$566 went forward to the general fund for mission work. The Women's Association report was dealt with by Mrs. Herbert Dolson, treasurer, who stated that \$923.87 had been raised. The W.A., had given the managers of the church \$275 to cover the pointing of the building.

Mr. F. L. Thompson, treasurer of the Sunday School, reported a steady year for this department of the church and commended those who gave their time and talents in this great labour of love. The superintendent of the Sunday School is Victor Ostrander. The Presbyterian Record report was presented by Mrs. W. A. Ostrander who urged all the members to consider subscribing to this fine journal of the church. The Young People's report was made by the president Victor Ostrander, in the absence of the treasurer, Miss Joan Crawford. This report covered the period Sept., 1957, to Sept., 1958.

The new treasurer of the PYPS, is Bill Hunter. Mr. Royal also reported on the Young People's work describing the fine calibre of young people attending the Society's meetings. It was announced that the winter conference for 1959 would be held at Norval and Union churches on the week-end of Feb. 13, 14, 15. This annual event was first inaugurated at Norval and Union Churches in February, 1950, by the Presbytery of West Toronto. It was held again on the Charge in February, 1952.

A meeting with the Kirk Session is being arranged by the music committee to discuss the formation of a junior choir and the whole question of music in the Union Church. The members of the music committee are Mrs. Lloyd Crichton, Mrs. Herbert Dolson, Mrs. Donald Dolson and Harvey Puckering. The organists of the congregation, Mrs. Lloyd Davison and Miss Anne Puckering, were reappointed with the thanks of the congregation for their labours in the past year. The question of evening or afternoon annual meetings was raised and the congregation decided to retain the afternoon sessions.

Dickson, engineering and Bruce A. Madole, supervising construction foreman responsible for the outside work.
