## Textile Man's Father Gave Name to Village

Member of a family from which Glen Williams took its name, Harry B. Williams, 71, died on Jan. 6th in Toronto Western Hospital after a brief illness.

Retired for two years, Mr. Williams, under his own name, had been in the textile agency business since 1932. Before that he had been associated with Gordon Mackay Co. Ltd. and Silks Ltd.

He was born in Glen Williams, the son of Joseph Williams. The family lived in the present Jack Hepburn home adjoining what is now the Apple Products firm, where Mr. Williams had a grist and lumber mill. The community of Glen Williams was named after Harry Williams' great-grandfather, who was the first settler. As a young man he attended St. John's United Church and sang in a choir.

Mr. Williams was a former chairman of the British Agents association. During World War 2 he served as a deputy administrator for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. He was a Mason, a member of High Park Lodge and the Scottish Rite; Weston and Mississauga Golf clubs; the Carleton Club and the Canadian Club; and a member of Humbercrest United Church. He lived at 58 Rivercrest Drive in the city.

He leaves his wife, Myra Hargreaves, a daughter Mrs. William R. Jackson, Montreal, a son, J. Ken Williams Toronto, and two grandsons. Last member of his family, he was predeceased by a brother Charles of Chicago, two sisters Eva (Mrs. Harry Holdroyd) of Toronto and Gertrude (Mrs. W. H. Willson) of Georgetown, and a sister in infancy, Charles Willson of 18 Ewing St., is a nephew.

Funeral service was held on Friday afternoon at the Turner and Porter Funeral Home, Toronto, with interment later that afternoon in the family plot in Glen Williams Cemetery.
