Town Lake, School District Are 1959 Council Business

The proposed conservation lake on the 9th Line, and possibility of dropping out of North Halton high school district this year were two items discussed briefly at last Thursday's council meeting.

Water chairman Ern Hyde said council should have Alex MacLaren, Georgetown's representative on the Credit Valley Conservation Authority do everything possible to show the need for the lake to be vital to the town's water supply. Orangeville, he said, has already purchased land for such a lake, and is taking advantage of the government's winter works program to receive a 75 per cent subsidy for labour cost in clearing the site.

Mayor Armstrong said that the Georgetown proposal has still to

receive final approval by the government. Reeve Sargent warned that the town might be committing itself to a large expenditure, as cost of such a project is shared 50-50 by the government and the conservation authority which in turn apportions cost among municipalities deriving the benefits.

Cr. Harrison asked if action is being taken to leave the high school district.

Mayor Armstrong said that county council must, before July 1st in any year, approve withdrawal of a municipality which would be effective the following January. Now that grants do not change if the town has its own area, the mayor said there should be no doubt about how council would feel about withdrawing.

REALTORS TOP BRADFORD IN THRILLER LAST NIGHT

Some four hundred hockey fans watched what could well have been a mid-winter preview of Intermediate B playoff hockey at Georgetown arena last night where Hunter's Realtors jarred the league-leading Bradford Fords 8-5 to move to within a single point of the top spot.

The Bradfords had trouble penetrating Hunter's defence which simulated the proverbial stone wall for most of the sixty minutes and was probably the key factor in the win. Big Dave Voyce was throwing his hulk around, with noticeable effectiveness and led the blue line crew to their best effort of the campaign with strong support from Geo. Grasby and Gerry Inglis in particular.

Playing coach Nick Ferri shifted Junior Beaumont from his regular rearguard position, added Bill Hewitt and himself, and came up with an explosive third line that accounted for three of the total 8. Bill Chard was influential going both ways. He figured twice on the score sheet but spent most of the night jolting blue uniforms with checks creditable to a player twice his weight.

Chard netted the first Georgetown marker from Dave Irons at 7:50 of the first frame after Dowdall opened it for Bradford at the 7:20 mark from Gibson and Varey, and Bud Varey captured the lead for the locals on a pass from Blake Inglis at 8:57.

Mr. Wright planned the course for the Georgetown class which is conducted by Mrs. Ruth Goss, a member of his staff. Each member of the class brought a guest and the art class taught by Miss Dorothy Stone gave up their usual lesson to come and hear this renowned speaker. 500 New Georgetowner's Since October, Population Now 8722

A report from the office of Assessment Commissioner Joseph Gibbons this week reveals that 500 people have taken up residence in Georgetown since the end of September.

The new figure of 8,722 compiled to the end of December indicates that since 1954 the town has more than doubled in population and before the end of 1959 will have surpassed the 10,000 mark. Retracing the town's rapid growth since 1953 when the population was 3,779 shows that in some years expansion was well over one thousand people. Bob McDermott Returned School Board Chairman

Mr. McDermott reviewed projects started and completed last year, and outlined the major problems requiring action this year. The board expressed appreciation for an anonymous donation of \$40. which the board was instructed to use in the school.

Mechanize Town Business Office Plan of Mayor

Mechanization of the town business office, with an addressograph machine as the first step, was proposed by Mayor Armstrong, at council's first business meeting of the year last Thursday.

The mayor estimated that up to \$15,000 could be spent on equipment needed by a town this size, which is becoming imperative for efficient handling of water and tax accounts. This would include a billing machine, eliminating the present typing and hand-writing of accounts. The matter will be discussed further at future meetings.

Stress is on Safety At Home, School Meet

A panel discussion on safety in the Home, School, Industry and on the Highway, highlighted the January meeting of the Wigglesworth Home & School Association in the auditorium on Monday, Jan. 12th.

Hydro chairman E. W. Binkley moderated the panel comprising the fire chief, Jack Harlow; ambulance chief Ed Hall; Bell Telephone district manager, Lloyd G. Denby; safety director for Smith & Stone, Bob McMenemy; safety director for Swift's Harold Seckington; lawyer Douglas Latimer; CNR inspector Mr. Campbell; and local traffic officer Sgt. Ted Scott.

Particularly stressed was the importance of keeping household articles out of the reach of children, especially pills and medicine, detergents, cosmetics and mothballs.
