WHAT COUNCIL DID

McGilvray, Hyde Disagree On Water Engineer Reports

Advice on what to do about two conflicting reports on Georgetown's future water supply may be sought if Cr. Garfield McGilvray has his way.

At Thursday's council meeting, Cr. McGilvray said that an engineering firm which had just completed a survey didn't find much water and that he thinks council should spend a little more money and have another firm make a survey.

Cr. Ern Hyde, who is water committee chairman answered that Mr. McGilvray was apparently referring to another engineer of a few years back who told council there is all the water the town can use in the present location, but who did not present statistics to prove his point.

"This firm didn't give us what we wanted, but they told the truth," said Mr. Hyde "and they told us what our water limits are."

With Cr. McGilvray insisting that council has just one engineering firm's word against another, Cr. Hyde said the only solution is to ask town engineer Wm. H. Carr if he can substantiate which is correct, and if he can't, ask Mr. Carr to recommend someone who can. While his idea seemed to find favour with other councillors, it was left to the water committee to consider the question further.

The discussion led Mayor Armstrong to bring up a favourite subject, the chlorination of the town water supply. He has frequently complained of the chlorine taste since the chemical was introduced into the water system last year.

The mayor said he would like to check the proportion being used here compared with Toronto and Guelph where he has noticed no taste in the water.

Cr. John Gunn, who is a chemist, explained that the taste depends upon the residual chlorine in the water, and that the same quantities could be used in two towns, with more being used up combating bacteria in one location, leading to less residual.

"You've added to my department. I hope you add a little money with it," said Cr. Fred Harrison, who will be in charge of recreation as well as property and veterans' affairs this year.

Last year he had no budget at all and spent \$3500, Mr. Harrison said. He would like approximately one mill of the tax money in 1959 to make improvements at the park, particularly to the grandstand which he terms a "disgrace."

A resolution which Woodstock council asked council to consider was ordered filed. It dealt with inflation due to wage and price increases, claiming this adversely affects Canada's position in the world market, and expressed this concern in a letter to the federal government.

Mayor Armstrong said he does not consider it a local council's place to give advice to a higher government, no matter how sincere the request might be.

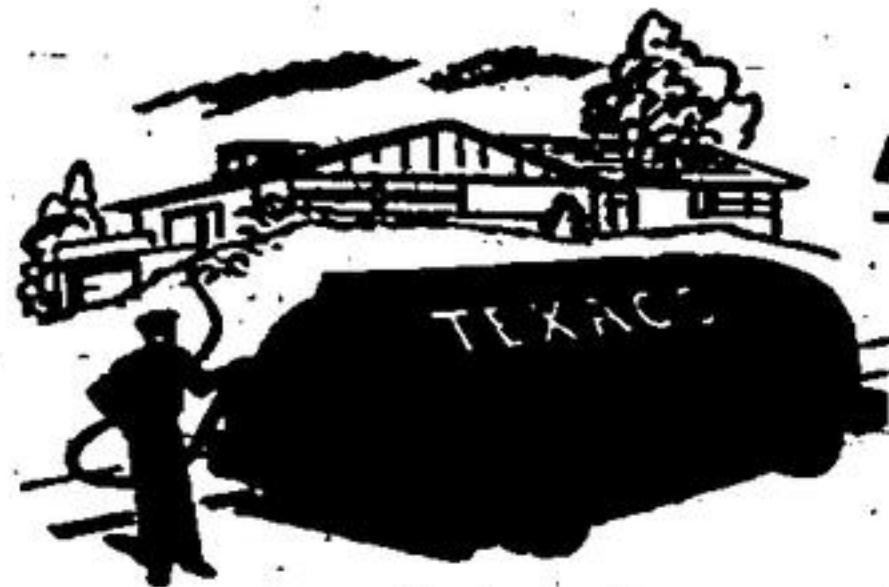
