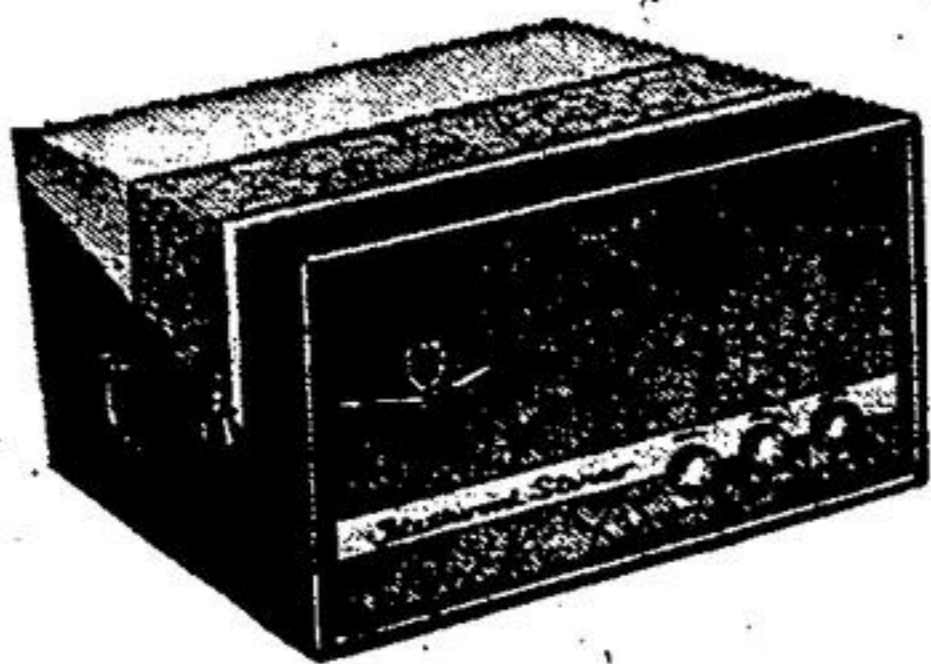

Two Injured in Week's Accidents

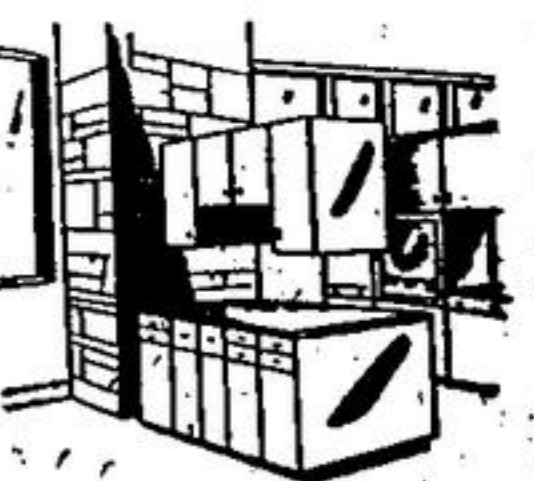

100 Farmerettes Display At Achievement 4-H Day

"Working with Wool", the fall project for Halton 4-H Homemaking Clubs, was brought to a successful conclusion last Saturday, February 7th at the Achievement Day in Milton high school. Approximately 100 girls from 10 clubs in the county completed this project exhibiting their Record Books and wool skirts or jumpers and participating in the activities of the day.

To exercise the skills which she had learned and further develop her abilities, each club member had the opportunity during the morning to judge a class of wool skirts, giving oral reasons for the placing; judge a class of skirt materials suitable for a given pattern and to select from samples offered, a blouse pattern and material appropriate for wearing with a displayed skirt.

Classes were then discussed and correct placings given and explained by the Home Economists in charge. Assisting Mrs. Borgstrom, Halton county home economist, were Miss Ruth Shaver of Carleton, Grenville and Russell counties and Miss Barbara Clark of Toronto.

After the luncheon interval the program became entertaining as well as educational as each club presented by exhibit, demonstration or skit, some aspects of the instruction included in the project. Many mothers and other interested friends attended in the afternoon, swelling the attendance as sponsors of Homemaking Clubs, to nearly 200. Women's Institutes, were represented by Mrs. Velma Norris, president of Halton district, who spoke briefly in praise of the work being accomplished by the clubs.

Five exhibits on the topic "A Wool Skirt and its Companions" were shown and in each case one member of the club acted as commentator. These were: Ashgrove, Helen Brooks, Barnockburn, Marilyn Madill, Dublin, Lorraine Cox; Hornby South, Anna Peacock; Nasagaweya, Veronica Goian. Miss Barbara Clark as visiting Home Economist then delivered a brief "critique" of the exhibits, making suggestions for their improvement and commending the clubs on the high quality of their work.

The programme of demonstrations and skills was headed by the presentation of Romby South...

"The Hows and Whys of Pressing Wool" with Evelyn McKay and Ruth Robertson as demonstrators. This was followed by Nelson's skit entitled "Wool, the Fibre and the Fabric" in which all eleven members took part. The actors were: Audrey Auckland, Helen Auckland, Ann Balch, Judy Breckon, Meryl Flock, Angeline Hrinchko, Shirley Hunt, Paula Jelinek, Beverley Roe, Barbara Rose and Bette Rose.

Palermo club also chose this topic presented in skit form by the members: Marie Adamo, Margaret Atkins, Brenda Breckon, Cecilia Carter, Judy Heslop, June Kingston, Sharron Joubert, Gail Lofquist, Darlene MacDougall.

Two more demonstrations, both on the topic "New Life for the Old Skirt" were given by Limehouse members Joy Patterson and Linda Clarke and by Glenna Stark and Winifred Marshall of Scotch Block. Miss Ruth Shaver gave the "critique" for this part of the program.

Climaxing the day was the Dress Parade when each member proudly modelled her skirt or jumper, appearing briefly on the stage to identify herself and give the cost of her skirt.

All members and leaders then received their special 4-H Homemaking Club spoons given in recognition of the completion of each project. New members also were presented with 4-H Club crests. Certificates of Achievement were awarded for each 2 projects completed and county and provincial honours-certificates and pins respectively for six and twelve projects. Receiving county honours at this Achievement Day were Aileen Harrop and Carolyn McLaughlin of Ashgrove; Judith Britton of Dublin; Patricia Crawford and Dorothy Kirkpatrick of Limehouse; Ann Balch and Paula Jelinek of Nelson; Margaret Atkins and Cecilia Carter of Palermo; Beverley and Muriel Newell of Scotch Block.

Provincial honours went to Evelyn McKay and Ruth Robertson of North Hornby club.

By vote of members and leaders it was decided to undertake the unit "Couture May be Smart" in the fall of 1959. The spring project for this year will be "The Club Girl Entertains" and this will commence almost immediately with Leaders' Training School being held at the Department of Agriculture on February 28th and 27th.
