## WHAT COUNCIL DID Discuss Widening Railway Bridges, Improving Crossing

Question of widening two overhead railway bridges, the John St. railway culvert, and providing a better surfaced route across the CNR tracks at the station received an airing Monday by council.

Discussion followed a motion by two councillors to engage a firm of Toronto consultants to make a preliminary report on replacing railway bridges on Main St. North and Mountainview Road. The firm had interviewed council last year about the service it could offer, and stressed that at present the government is footing a large share of such undertakings.

Cr. Fred Harrison, who with Deputy Reeve Gray made the motion, said that it would cost no more than \$400 to have such a report, that it had been town engineer Carr's suggestion, and that he felt it would be money well spent to find what could be done and what the cost might be.

Cr. Hyde said he would like a week to decide before voting on the motion, and Cr. Gunn agreed, saying that a cost estimate should also be obtained from the firm before proceeding. Cr. McGilvray suggested no action be taken until the town makes a decision on engaging a town engineer.

Cr. Elliott said he would like a similar study made of the John Street underpass and also suggested a traffic survey be made of travel across the tracks at the CNR station, with possibility of hard surfacing to eliminate ruts and bumps.

The Delta Craft firm, which is considering an expansion requiring a conveyor system across an unopened road allowance near its River Drive factory, and Wm. Ackerman, owner of the property, were advised that the town will cooperate in every way possible and will allow the conveyor, subject to plans being submitted for approval of council.

Cr. Harrison said this is private property and it wouldn't be proper for the town to get involved.

Proctor & Redfern, consulting engineers on the town's new sewage disposal plant, informed council by letter that tenders are being called this week by the Ontario Water Resources Commission for a trunk sewer, first step in the project. The project is being done under the winter works program, to take advantage of any saving which Georgetown can realize from this, it was pointed out. Tenders for the disposal plant will be called in early April, the firm said.

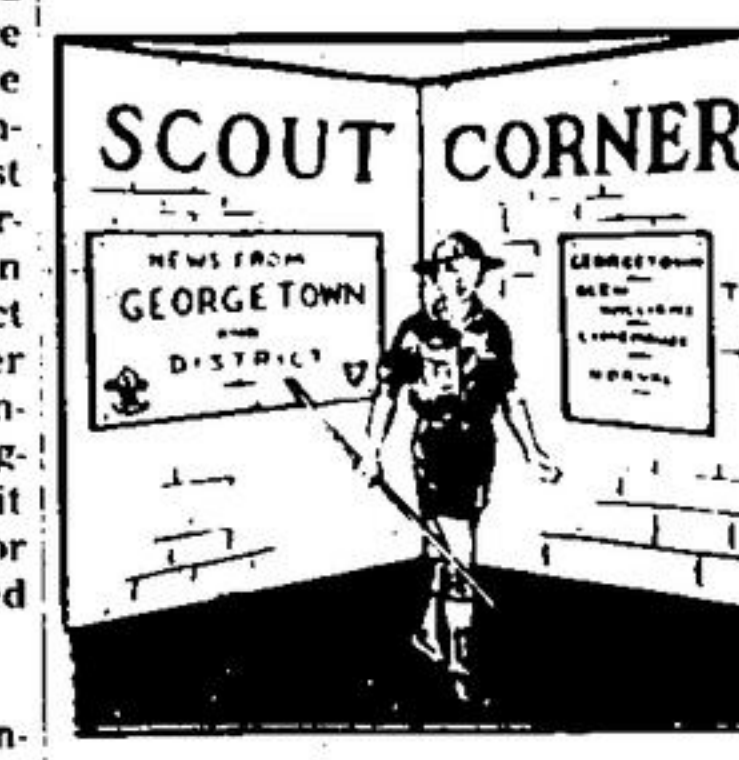
Three street lights will be installed on Gower Court, one of the streets in the newest part of Delrex.
