## WHAT COUNCIL DID

# New Industry Considers Old Papermill Location

Possibility of a new industry which might employ up to 50 people was mentioned at the Feb 2nd council meeting when W. B. Ackerman, owner of the old papermill, discussed closing of a road allowance in the vicinity. He explained that a chute which would be used in a woodworking business might block the road, which has never been opened. The property committee was asked to investigate and make a recommendation next Monday.

The first of 18 town owned building lots in a new subdivision created when property was acquired for the new Park school was sold.

Advertised on two occasions, tender bids had not been sufficiently high for council to sell any until now. An offer of \$1800 from James H. Lyons was accepted for one of the lots of Princess Anne Drive.

Council adjourned during the meeting to visit the funeral home to pay respects to the late W. G. Marshall, an ex-reeve and former police chief, whose death occurred on Monday.

Replying to a letter from the Georgetown Scouters' Council, the mayor proclaimed Feb. 14 - 22 as Boy Scout week in town. Council

was invited to attend a scout church service in St. George's Anglican on the 22nd.

Complaining of a chlorine taste and oily deposit in the water supply on Ostrander Blvd., Norton Nelson and Frank Robinson were told that next time the deposit is noticed, a sample should be taken for analysis.

## VOTE SECOND TERM FOR GOLF CLUB PRESIDENT

William McNally was elected to a second term as president of North Halton Golf and Country Club at a directors' meeting last week which followed the annual meeting of the club. He was one of fourteen directors reelected to office, others being Ross Duncan, who is vice-president, Jack Malcolm, James Linton, E. W. ## WHAT COUNCIL DID

### Choose James Rankine New Police Constable

James Ronald Rankine of Oshawa, will replace Frank Dennis as a constable on Georgetown's police force. One of eight applicants interviewed by council on February 4th, he was chosen for the position.

Mr. Rankine has had a year's experience as a police constable in Whitby, and for the past year has been working as a plastering contractor in Oshawa. He is a World War 2 veteran, with navy service overseas, married and father of three children.

At the meeting, Csts. Evan Rollins and R. D. Whitson were promoted from probationers, with consequent salary increases.

The water and public works committees were asked to report, in answer to a letter from Delrex Developments asking about sewer and water service to the new shopping plaza which is expected to be in operation in early June.

Cr. John Elliott said he had been informed by Proctor & Redfern, consulting engineers, that tenders are expected to be called this week for a trunk sewer, first step in construction of the new disposal plant.

A check on waterworks pressure charts revealed that the highest pressure recorded has been 140 pounds, Cr. Ern Hyde reported. The check had been made following a complaint from Halton Co-Op that varying pressures had interfered with a gauge on their sprinkling system and pressure of 150 lbs. had damaged the gauge.

Mr. Hyde said council should investigate possibility of again using the old Silvercreek reservoir, to accomplish the double purpose of having more water available for peak loads, and evening out the pressure, which might be helping cause the complaints of chlorine taste and discoloration in the town water supply.

Mr. Hyde said use of Silvercreek might add half a million gallons daily. An engineer's advice should be obtained, he said. Mayor Armstrong said Halton Health Unit should also be consulted, as an okay from health authorities would be necessary as a first step. When Silvercreek was last used, tests were showing as low as "D" he said.

"I have read of two fire chiefs having heart attacks at fires," said Cr. Anne Currie, "and wondered if our local department has a yearly medical check."

Mayor Armstrong said he believes the local brigade is a close-knit group and members would take their own action to avoid any danger of a man not in good health being in danger. Cr. Hyde suggested that perhaps firemen would like to have yearly health checks, and it was left to the fire committee to discuss this with the brigade if they wish.
