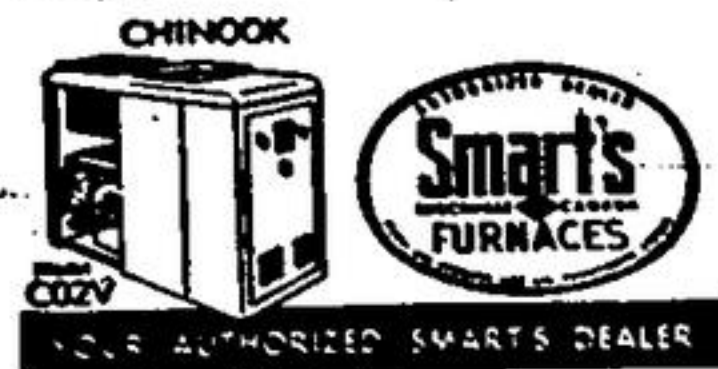

An interesting and enlightening sermon based on Psalms 121 and 125 was delivered by Rev. J. Pointing out that these Psalms were two of a collection of Psalms sung by pilgrims on their way to Jerusalem Mr. Graham explained that these pilgrims loved the mountains of Jerusalem and Palestine and that the beauty of these mountains made them think of the greatness, beauty and glory of God. They also realized that the mountains offered them safety and protection and they compared this to the safety and protection they could find in God.

God can reveal Himself to us today in the same way as that in which He revealed Himself to these pilgrims of ancient days. Monday night, January 26th, was "Movie Night" at the Manor when Mr. Allen, using the Manor's own projector, presented a motion picture, "The Sceptre and the Mace," for the residents. The film sketched the growth of parliamentary government in Britain through the centuries and then depicted the opening of parliament at Ottawa some months ago by Queen Elizabeth II. This very fine film with its ceremony and pageantry appealed to the audience very much and was greatly enjoyed. This film was sponsored by the Globe and Mail and was preceded by a short film, "The Inside Story," which depicted the various stages in the writing, printing, packaging, and shipping of The Globe and Mail.

A large amount of business occupied the attention of the twenty-two members of the Hobby Class present at their regular meeting on Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 28. Mrs. Lockie and Mrs. Allen conducted the meeting. A donation of knitting needles and knitting bag from Mrs. John Hollingsworth of Kilmorie was gratefully received and appreciation expressed. Several new projects in connection with aprons, quilts, and scrap-books were discussed. Refreshment of a cold drink and Christmas cake donated by Mrs. Lockie and Mrs. Allen were enjoyed to the close of the meeting.

A challenging sermon based on the topic of Christ's Second Coming, was delivered in the chapel on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 1, by Rev. K. L. Campbell, pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church in Milton. Mr. Jack Mountain, who played the piano for the singing of the hymns and Mr. Jack Bristow assisted Mr. Campbell in conducting the service. Mr. Bristow and Mr. Mountain sang an enjoyable duet, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." In the Milton high school auditorium, on Saturday, February 7th, the Halton county 4-H Homemaking Club Achievement Day was held. This is an event which marks the conclusion of the winter project, "Working with Wool." Ten clubs, with a total membership of 100 girls, have participated in the programme, and an interesting day took place. Girls displayed their wool skirts or jumpers, and their record books. They put into practice their instruction, by judging classes of skirts and skirt materials, and by selecting suitable blouse patterns and materials to wear with a given skirt.

A special feature of the afternoon programme was the dress parade, when each member modelled the garment she had made. Exhibits, demonstrations, and skits prepared by the clubs, were also part of the afternoon programme.

The 4-H Homemaking clubs start a new study almost immediately, with the project "The Club Girl Entertains" for which the leaders' training school will be held on February 26th and February 27. Inquiries regarding this work are welcomed at the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture office, Milton.

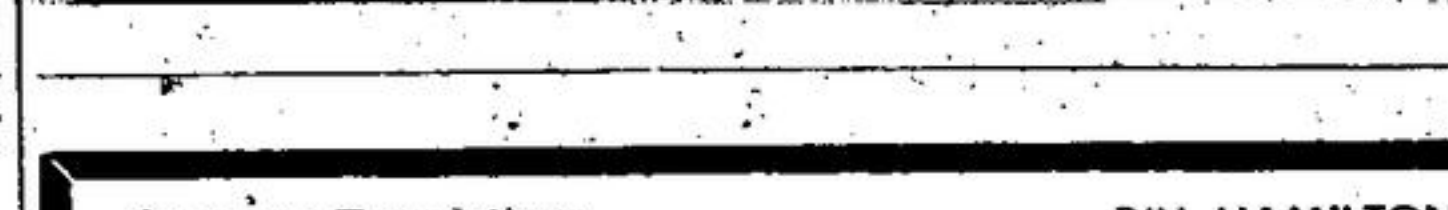

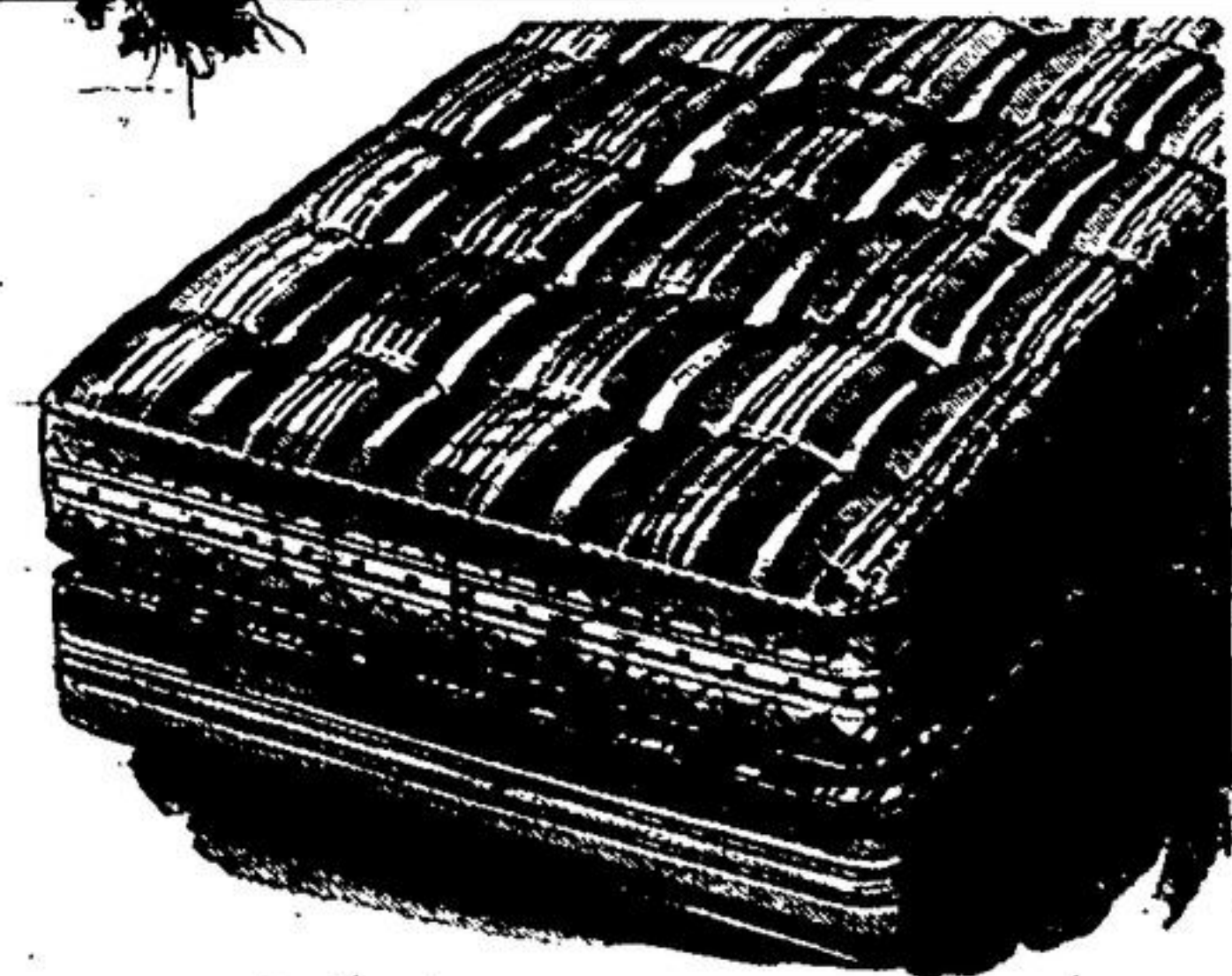
