WHAT COUNCIL DID

GRANT CEMETERY BOARD \$6,000. OF TOWN TAXES

A \$6,000 grant to Georgetown Cemetery Board will be included in the 1959 tax budget this year.

Members of the board, with George Muckart as spokesman, requested this at Monday's council meeting, pointing out that it would be impossible to finance cemetery costs this year without tax assistance since 1956. A surplus accumulated by the board was used last year for fencing the property, Mr. Muckart explained, and the board is faced with such expenses this year as purchase of a new mower and improvements to the newer part of the cemetery.

A mortuary has also been discussed by the board, and while an architect was consulted on this two years ago, there has been no definite decision to add this to cemetery facilities.

Moving to grant \$6,000 to the board, finance minister McGillivray expressed council's appreciation for foregoing a tax grant the two previous years.

Asking if an entrance off Maple Ave. had ever been considered, Mr. Fred Harrison was told by the treasurer Harry Savings that no land is available for this, as an old entrance had been closed years ago and plots sold from the old road allowance.

Board member Sam Mackenzie explained to council that the cemetery charge system is double to non-taxpayers, as the board had found that Georgetown's rates of \$100 for a 4-grave plot had been proving too attractive to outsiders.

TEACHER, PARENTS MEET AT BLUE MOUNTAIN SCHOOL

The second teacher-parents meeting was held at Blue Mountain School, Ballinacree, on February 16th when further discussions took place on playground equipment being made. Parents, also had a chance to discuss the progress of their children with the teacher, Mrs. Richard Shortill.
