

First we bring you parts of Bylay No. 58-25, for the regulation of traffic.

Part III — Parking 3. Method of Parking:

r. Parallel: No person shall park a vehicle side of the street, having regard and the Gore Bay Dispatch, Manifor the direction in which the vehicle had been proceeding and unless the right-front and right-rear the roadway.

(2) Angle. Where angle parking is permitted, no person shall park a vehicle except at an angle of forty-five degrees with the edge of the roadthe vehicle is nearest to the edge of the roadway.

(4). Parking Prohibited: (1) In Specified Places.
