A. M. Pratt, director of curriculum for the Dept. of Education, Manitoba, said in adjudicating 1958 entries for the better newspaper contest:

One of the features was the undoubted excellence of photography and engraving in many of the entries, he remarked. "Another feature I especially commend to the attention of all editors and publishers regardless of financial resources is the encouragement of local contributors, particularly those whose efforts fall into the kind of writing known as creative."

"The weekly newspaper can play a very important part in the field of creative writing by encouraging local writers, however youthful, to submit their work for publication in its pages."

Winner of the Joseph T. Clarke trophy for newspapers under 1500 in the general excellence contest was the Winchester Press representing Eastern Ontario. The Rodney Mercury, from the western area of the province was second, and the Gore Bay Dispatch, Manitoulin, was third.

The Albert V. Nalah trophy for centres of 1500 to 2500 population was won by the Port Elgin Times, whose publisher is a former Toronto advertising agency executive, Kenneth Pettis. The Stouffville Tribune was second and the Strathroy Age-Dispatch third.

In competition for the Aurora Banner trophy for towns of 4500 and over, the Canadian Statesman of Bowmanville was first, the Midland Free Press Herald second and Leamington Post third.

The J. G. Johnston trophy for typographical excellence was awarded to the Port Elgin Times. The Printed Word trophy for best editorial page was awarded to the Midland Free Press Herald with the Tillsonburg News second and Leamington Post and News third. Cockfield Brown and Company trophy for advertising excellence went to the Renfrew Advance with the Burlington Gazette second and Midland Free Press Herald third.

An award for the best use of pictures, by the Fairchild Camera and Instrument Corporation, was won by the Midland Free Press Herald.

The E. T. Stephenson trophy for Best Front Page was won by the Leamington Post, with the Canadian Statesman second and the Oakville Journal third.

Anne Bonn of Toronto was presented with the \$125 OWNA bursary for her thesis on the Listowel Banner. She wrote the thesis last summer during her vacation from Ryerson Institute where she is a student in journalism.

Edward J. Mannion, director of advertising for the Thomson newspapers, spoke on the subject of "Retail Advertising."

Canadian Pacific Railway officials arranged an extensive tour of the new Royal York addition — a 400 room addition that again makes the hotel largest hotel in the Commonwealth.

### POLICE NEWS

This is your police department's maiden voyage into the literary field. Where each week we shall attempt to bring to you items of interest pertaining to local by-laws, requests, suggestions, or perhaps a funny story or even a poem.

First we bring you parts of By-law No. 58-25, for the regulation of traffic.

**Part III — Parking**

3. Method of Parking:

(1) Parallel:

No person shall park a vehicle on any street other than a one-way street unless on the right hand side of the street, having regard for the direction in which the vehicle had been proceeding and unless the right-front and right-rear wheels of the vehicle are parallel to and distant respectively no more than six inches from the edge of the roadway.

(2) Angle.

Where angle parking is permitted, no person shall park a vehicle except at an angle of forty-five degrees with the edge of the roadway and so that the front end of the vehicle is nearest to the edge of the roadway.

(4) Parking Prohibited:

(1) In Specified Places. On a Sidewalk.

In front of a public or private driveway.

Within an intersection.

Within ten feet of a fire hydrant.

On a crosswalk.

Within twenty feet of a crosswalk at an intersection.

Please keep those parking meters charged, as contrary to public opinion, we do not like issuing parking tickets. Thank you.
