## "Best Yet" Is Comment On Night School Display

"The best yet" was the expressed opinion of many visitors to the annual night school display held at Knox Church Hall on Friday, February 20th. The display was opened by Ernest Forgrave, representative of the North Halton high school district board on the "Georgetown" night school committee. Mr. Forgrave after welcoming the guests and naming the committee presented Murray Coles, Esquing chairman of the board who expressed their thanks to the night school committee and spoke of his long acquaintance with Mrs. John Glynn of Limehouse, the chairman, whom he had known as a young teacher before her marriage.

It was difficult to believe on a tour of the hall that the displays were the product of only twelve two-hour lessons as most of the work shown was of truly professional quality.

In the displays of sewing were found adorable smocked frocks and other outfits for the small fry, beautifully tailored suits for the ladies as well as lovely dresses for young and not so young, which will be appearing in Georgetown's Easter parade. Another preview of the parade was a veritable flower garden of Easter bonnets in all the pastel colours. The flower theme of this display was further enhanced by a background of real flowering plants loaned by the Norton Floral Co.

An outstanding display of colourful hooked rugs in both modern and traditional designs occupied most of one wall. On the other two summer and winter landscapes and marine pictures, still life studies of luscious fruit and vivid flowers, portraits of people and animals and an occasional abstract "certified to the continued interest in oil painting."

Leathercraft was represented by samples of the different techniques and really outstanding craftsmanship in carved and tooled purses. Welding showed some of the equipment used as well as "before" and "after" samples of the type of work done.

Smart modern coffee tables and dressers and beautifully finished upholstered antique and modern chairs and an antique settee testified that "do-it-yourself" can have a really professional look. The academic subjects, typing, effective speaking and conversational French, produced colourful and effective displays of posters and reading material about their subjects and enthusiastic students from these classes were on hand to answer questions about the courses they had taken.

The photography exhibit, both in color and black and white indoor and outdoor was outstanding. Samples of the student's work included some taken of the other classes in session and a splendid shot of our photogenic Principal J. L. Lambert. Slides were shown during the evening as well as types of cameras and processing equipment. During the display several views were taken in the hall. Experts were on hand to answer questions and were very generous with their help.

After the tour a refreshing cup of coffee and cookies were provided by the Knox Church ladies. Weather conditions this year

have made travelling very difficult especially at night. Some students are on shift work, some move away - many have small children and there is always unexpected illness. We feel therefore that our attendance record of about seventy-five per cent testifies to the quality of the instruction offered and the enthusiasm of the students.

On Tuesday, March 10th, there will be another display, this one of choral singing and square dancing, in Wrigglesworth auditorium. Everyone is welcome. There is no admission charge and after a short programme of songs and dances audiences will be invited to join in the square dancing themselves.

On April 14th the annual meeting and election of the Georgetown night school committee will be held. The committee would like to remind the people of Georgetown that it is your night school, run by your volunteer committee and sponsored by the high school district board. They would like to see people from all sections, especially the new ones, of Georgetown, and the surrounding township, to hear their suggestions and to elect their representatives to carry on the work that contributes so much to their community life.

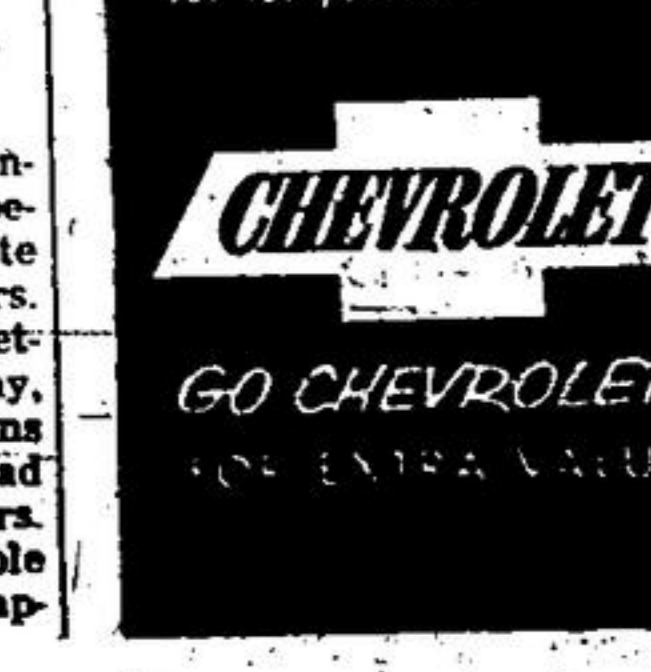

**Golden Anniversary of Powered Flight in Canada**



Fifty years ago, on February 23, J. A. D. McCurdy flew his Silver Dart (inset) at Baddeck, N.S., marking the first powered flight in Canada. Since that historic event, development in aviation has taken tremendous strides. Another milestone will be reached later this year when Trans-Canada Air Lines takes delivery of the first of its six huge DC-8 Jetliners which will fly at 550 miles an hour and carry 127 passengers. Mr. McCurdy will be taking part in many of the Golden Anniversary celebrations throughout Canada this year.
