**DAUGHTER WAS ONCE RESIDENT IN TOWN**  
A former Georgetown resident, Mrs. Stan Grabb, suffered a family bereavement when her mother, Mrs. James Dudgeon died in Toronto General Hospital.  
Mrs. Dudgeon, the former Elizabeth Johnston, was born in Elderslie Township 77 years ago. She leaves two sons, Victor and Clifford of Elderslie and two daughters, Mrs. Stan Grabb, Harrow, and Miss Verle Dudgeon, Toronto. Funeral service and burial took place in Chesley.  
Mr. and Mrs. Grabb left town several years ago when he joined the Ontario Provincial Police. Prior to that he operated a furniture store in the present location of the Herald office.

**Add 550 Phones, Town Exchange Now Has 3700**  
Net income of \$38,899,289 for the year ended December 31, a steadily increasing number of telephones and shareholders, and a "notable increase in productivity" are revealed in the 79th annual report of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada issued this week.  
The report states that net income was \$2,862,120 higher than in 1957. Earnings per share amounted to \$2.15, the same as in the previous year, as there were more shares outstanding. The regular dividend of \$2 a share was paid and surplus was increased by \$2,718,860.  
The increase of 185,465 telephones brought the total in service at the end of the year to 3,140,349. Some 75,000 coloured telephones were installed during the year.  
This expansion was reflected in Georgetown by the addition of 550 telephones. L. G. Denby, Bell manager for this region says, bringing the total in service here as of December 31 to 3700.

**First 4-Legged Prisoner 3 Hours in Local Jail**  
After spending three hours in the local jail cells, Ferdinand is out on bail — that is.  
The police department's first 4-legged prisoner, Ferdinand, along with another young black and white Holstein calf was discovered on No. 7 Highway west of the town limits by a passing motorist James Sprout of 10 Stuart Cres., Wilkesville, and taken to the police station where he was locked up, apparently for impersonating a police cruiser.  
The calves fell off the back of a truck owned by Albert Robinson of R R 1, Georgetown, however, only one calf survived the fall, only to be locked up from 7 a.m. until 10 when claimed by his owner.

**Residents Would Have Limehouse Hill Fixed**  
A deputation of Limehouse residents representing the Women's Institute and the school association interviewed Esquering council at a recent meeting concerning straightening the 5th Line hill. The matter was left in abeyance by council until weather conditions permit further investigation.  
An item which has not occurred for some time came before council when a sheep claim was paid to J. J. Atkinson who had three sheep killed and two injured by dogs. Total bill was \$70, with \$8 paid to A. N. Stark for two valuation trips. Aubrey Grant, Stewarttown, was appointed township relief officer at a salary of \$100 a year.  
Adjustments were made in the pay rate for road employees, operators receiving a 6c an hour increase and labour rate set at \$1.10 an hour. Council approved the proposal of Toronto Township to build a new 6-room school at Meadowdale, and the issue of \$130,000 debentures for this. A small corner of the township is included in that school area.
