An announcement has been made, that Halton is now designated a Certified Brucellosis Area. The establishment of this area took place on February 1st, 1959, and will be established until February 1st, 1962. The county is given his designation, when tests show that less than one per cent of the cattle are affected, and less than

five percent of the herds. This designation will be of benefit to all cattle owners in Halton, since the health standards allow fos sales to practically all parts of

As a result of this legislation regarding Brucellosis, cattle moved into the area must be accompanied by a Health Certificate obtainable at any office of the Health of Animals division of the Canadian Dept. of Agriculture.


