Junior Farmer Debaters Advance to Semi-Finals

The Halton entry in the Ontario Junior Farmer debating competition moved into the semi-finals by defeating South Simcoe, in de-

termining a negative and affirmative team from each side in two debates.

The subject for the present rounds of debates is: "Resolved that current price spreads of Canadian food products are justified." At a debate held in Alliston, the affirmative team from Halton, of Sandy Hepburn and Evelyn Booth was awarded the decision. A win was also given to the negative team of Joan Wrigglesworth and Bill Wilson, at the section of the debate held in Milton.

This competition is keenly contested by Junior Farmer groups in the province. At the present time only three counties remain in the competition. Early in March, Halton will debate against Peterborough county in the semi-finals. The winners of this debate will compete in the final competition, against Oxford county.

The final debate will be held on Friday, March 13th, at the Ontario Junior Farmer Conference being held at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

Hydro Chairman Member Of Radio Panel Group

Hydro commission chairman E. W. Binkley was a member of a panel which discussed hydro power on a radio broadcast on CFJB, in Brampton, last Tuesday morning. It was part of National Electric Week promotion.

Also on the panel were George Robertson, Toronto region superintendent; Charles Macintosh of hydro's information division; Elmore Archdekin, a Brampton commissioner; and Mrs. Carole McLean, Brampton housewife.

Mr. Robertson spoke of the future of electricity as applied to such things as cooking a roast in 12 minutes, electric space heating and a TV set which will hang like a picture on the wall. The panelists discussed matters of interest to housewives, like how billing charges are made up, why light bulbs burn out and how water heaters operate.

An explanation of Ontario Hydro and how this public utility operates was also given on the program.

TCA MAN TELLS LIONS ABOUT TRAVEL BY AIR

HALTON CERTIFIED BRUCELLOSIS AREA

J. E. W. An announcement has been made that Halton is now designated a Certified Brucellosis Area. The establishment of this area took place on February 1st, 1959, and will be established until February 1st, 1962. The county is given this designation, when tests show that less than one per cent of the cattle are affected, and less than five percent of the herds.

This designation will be of benefit to all cattle owners in Halton, since the health standards allow for sales to practically all parts of the world.

As a result of this legislation regarding Brucellosis, cattle moved into the area must be accompanied by a Health Certificate obtainable at any office of the Health of Animals division of the Canadian Dept. of Agriculture.

ESCAPES INJURY WHEN CAR CLIPS HYDRO POLE

Michael Fitzmaurice of 36 Henry Street escaped injury when his car, a 1953 Pontiac clipped off a hydro pole after skidding off of control on Victoria Cresc. on Wednesday, Feb. 18th.

Mr. Fitzmaurice was driving west on the crescent at about 9:20

Wednesday night when his car started to slide sideways on the icy surface. He applied the brakes but was unable to stop the coasting vehicle which met with the heavy pole on the north side of the street.

The impact broke the pole off 6" from the ground and damaged the left front bumper, grille and rad of the car to the extent of an

estimated \$200. Damage to the pole totalled \$100. Cst. Evan Rollins was the investigating officer.
