The Highway Traffic Act states, and I quote:—
Section 5(1)—Every motor vehicle while being driven on a highway, shall have attached to and exposed on the front and back thereof, in a conspicuous position, a number plate furnished by the Department showing in plain figures the number of the permit issued for the current year.

By-law No. 58-25 Municipality of Georgetown—Part II, Obedience to Traffic Regulations.
1. Obedience to Traffic Signs and Signals—Every person shall promptly obey all signals given either by a police officer or by a traffic control device or a traffic signal.
