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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Only Answer Possible

Replying to a letter from town council, asking consideration on mortgages, held by unemployed Malton workers, Central Mortgage and Housing has answered that it cannot authorize wholesale waivers of mortgage payments, and that each case must be dealt with on its own merits.

It was the expected answer from CHMC, for it would be a chaotic condition were such action to be taken. While the present situation affects large numbers of people, the fact is that house-holders, wherever they are employed, are subject to reverses, and the nation's business cannot operate on the premise that the day a man becomes unemployed, his financial obligations should cease.

We cannot think that lending institutions will not use common sense in dealing with men who have lost their jobs, during the period of readjustment. At the same time, there is a proportion of men who have savings which they will use to keep up mortgage payments, or who can borrow from relatives. Others whose new jobs will take them elsewhere, will be selling their homes, with new owners assuming the mortgage obligations.

Meanwhile any man who is encountering difficulty should take CHMC advice and contact the Toronto office or lending company which is backing him. We are sure he will have a sympathetic reception and an answer found for his problem.

Aftermath of Malton

Announcement of the postponement of a fund campaign for a hospital in Georgetown is one of the side-effects of the Malton layoffs.

The hospital committee, with sketch plans reaching the final stages, land acquired and most of the preliminary work done, had been in the midst of planning the financial campaign when the Malton news came. Wisely, the board felt that the time inopportune to launch a large-scale

drive and has postponed such plans.

The hospital association stresses, however, that this is only temporary. Meanwhile, it is hoped that organizations will continue their projects for hospital aid. Information has now been supplied by the architects covering costs of furnishings and equipment, and those who might wish to donate specific items are invited to make enquiries of the association.
