Clean Sweep for Realtors 4 Wins, Tie with Stouffville

Last year's group champions, the Stouffville Clippers will be watching from the sidelines when the Central Ontario Intermediate B cup goes up for grabs this season.

The former league winners were bounced rudely from contention Friday night without the consolation of having tasted victory even once in the best of seven semi-final. Their Nemesis, Georgetown Hunters Realtors needed just five games to deflate the Clippers, combining four wins and a tie. The Hunters doubled up the Stouffvilles 6 to 3 in their final encounter on Friday. Dave Irons showing the way with two goals.

He netted the opener at 5.09, Ron Dixon at 5.53 and Junior Beaumont at 19.51 counting the other 1st period tallies, Blake Inglis taking a hand in each of them. Ross put Stouffville on the score sheet from O'Connor and Gaymen at 9.04.

Both clubs were held scoreless in the middle stanza but the red lights resumed blinking in the third as the locals outsniped the Clippers 3 to 2.

Magdy, Irons and Jerry Inglis counted for the Hunters while Stouffville's young opportunist, Gayman, on an unassisted rush and Nicholas from O'Connor were the Clipper marksmen.

Dixon collected 2 assists in the last period, Beaumont and Bud Varey one apiece.

Jack Rhodes was a standout in the Georgetown cage and tied himself in knots to frustrate Stouffville riflemen on several attempts and hold their average to but one tally per period.

Georgetown had to come off the floor to chalk up their 5-4 squeaker on Thursday. They lagged 2-1 at the end of one period and 4-1 after two, but recovered in the finale in time to salvage the win.

Irons also played a major part in this one, triggering a pair while singles went to Jerry Inglis, Ron Dixon and Bud Varey. It was Varey's goal that broke the 4-all tie and put the Realtors ahead to stay. That came at 17.45.

Stouffville traded their goalie for a sixth attacker in the final minute but Rhodes survived the barrage of rubber.

Bradford handled Milton in the other half of the semi-finals four games to none.

WELLS MAY BE FLOODED
With this winter's heavy snow and the chance of a sudden spring thaw, there is every possibility that some wells in rural areas may be flooded with surface water.

Bringing this to the attention of residents, Halton Health Unit in a bulletin issued this week to the county press, offers advice and assistance on the chlorination and testing of wells. The Unit warns that surface water may carry dangerous pollution and, for complete safety, water from wells so affected should be boiled before using.

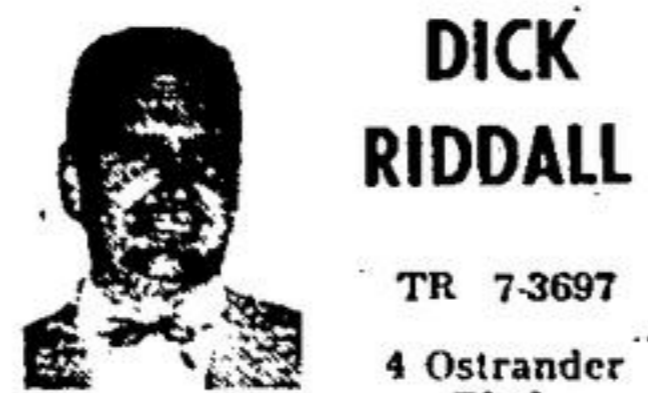
