Its purpose was two-fold—to keep Canadians informed and to do it in an entertaining way. Since its inception Project '59 has won plaudits from both press and public.

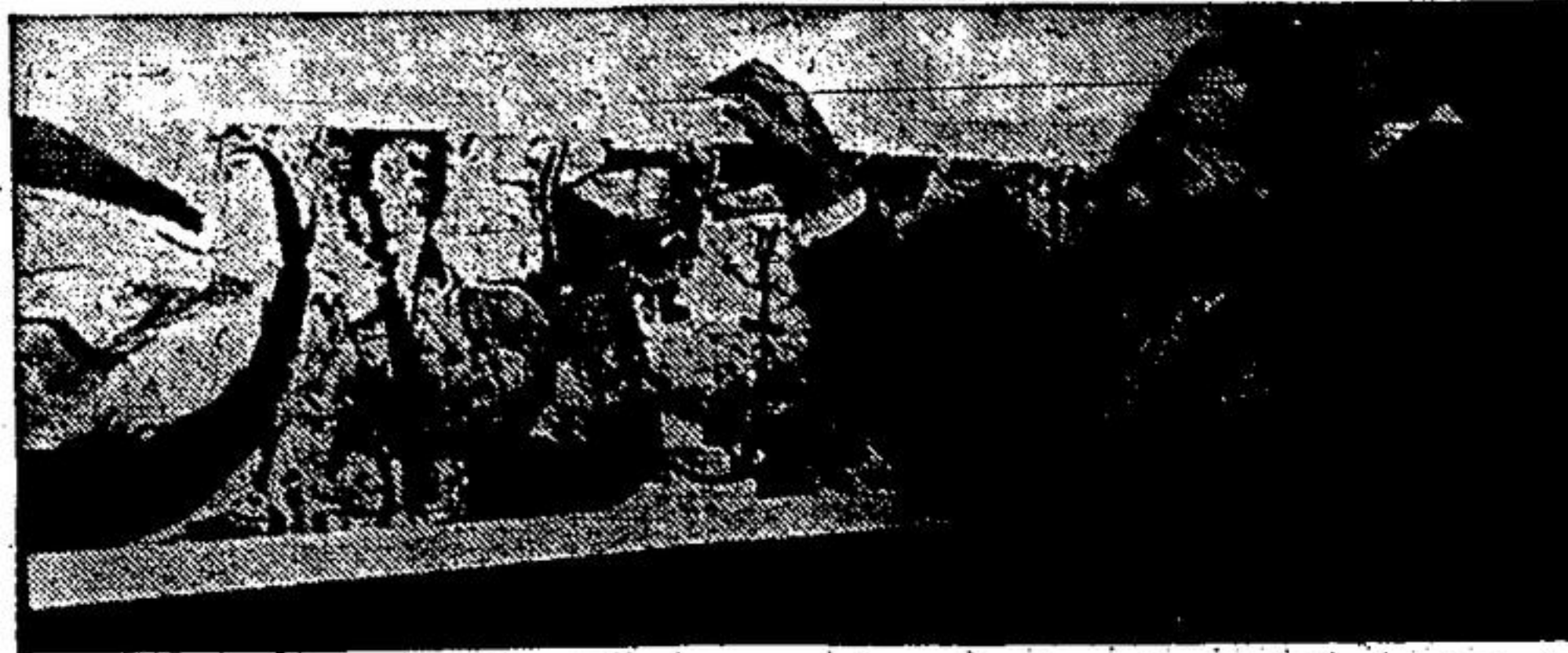

## Oakville Band, Kilbride Guides Provide Manor Entertainment

Speaking on the general theme of "Commonplace things," Rev. D. A. Powelson, rector of Grace Anglican Church, Milton, delivered an earnest sermon in the chapel of the Manor on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 15th. Mr. Powell began his sermon by alluding to the fact that Satan wanted Jesus to perform the spectacular feat of leaping from the pinnacle of the Temple as described in the passage of the scripture that he had read from the fourth chapter of St. Matthew. This world is full of spectacular and sensational things, and some persons see God in the spectacular things of life, rather than in those things which are commonplace and simple. Jesus Himself lived a simple life in a simple home, and we can show our fellow men the glory of God in the commonplace things of life. Mrs. Ray Waters was at the piano for the service and four young girls helped in the singing of the hymns.

On Sunday afternoon, Feb. 15th, after the church service, the residents were entertained at a band concert by their faithful friends, bandmaster Frank Lockley and 25 bandmen of the Oakville Citizens Band. Mr. Lockley acted as master of ceremonies. Honoured guests were present in the persons of Mr. and Mrs. William Card and their young son and daughter. Mr. Card is the reeve of Oakville, and was warden of the county last year and is the present chairman of the Board of Management for Halton Manor. As is usual whenever this fine band visits the Manor, the program was full of melody and variety. The nine selections on the program began with the stirring march, Flag of Freedom, and ended with the toe tapping, navy patrol march, The Blue Jackets. A tribute was paid to St. Valentine's Day with the playing of Let Me Call You Sweet heart and Cruising Down the River. A very melodious Welsh hymn, Aberystwyth, and the Halton Manor "Special Favourite," an Old Timers' Waltz, delighted the audience. In a South American tang, Spanish Serenade, bandman Richard Andrews played a very fine euphonium solo part. At the close of the program Mr. Card addressed the residents briefly. He spoke of the pleasure he felt in being present and paid tribute to the fine program that had just been played. Muriel Thompson thanked Mr. Card, Mr. Lockley, and the band for the delightful afternoon.

It was welcome news to the band's very appreciative and grateful audience when Mr. Lockley announced that the band would present another concert in the latter half of March. In Christ's service he found an opportunity to use his great missionary enterprise.

### FARM NEWS

#### INCLUDE HAY SHOW AT SEED DISPLAY DAY

J. E. W. A hay show will be included in this year's annual seed display day, to be held in the agricultural hall at the fair grounds, Milton, on Thursday, March 19th. This event is sponsored by the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association, and the decision to include a hay show was made at the annual directors' meeting held on Friday, February 13th. In planning the program several competitions have been included. The hay show will include classes for types of hay, first cut, second cut and will include both baled and chopped classes. Another competition has been added for those attending, in the form of a forage plant identification class. This will be an opportunity for those in attendance to observe the various kinds of fodder plants used in hay and pasture mixtures in Halton. The section for Junior Farmer educational exhibits is being included against this year, and over the years it has been keenly contested by the four Junior Farmer groups in Halton. The afternoon programme this year will include discussions on weed control, seed varieties, pasture and hay management, and soils.
