

STUDENTS PRESENT OIL PAINTING AS REMEMBRANCE OF OLD HIGH SCHOOL

An oil painting by local artist Frank Black will have an honoured place in Georgetown High School in future years.

The painting, commissioned by the students, portrays the old portion of the school scheduled for demolition in a construction program presently in progress. John Lenz, president of the Student Council, presented the painting which was received by school board chairman Murray Coles and unveiled by another student, Joan Cummins, at the high school commencement exercises Friday evening in Knox Church Hall.

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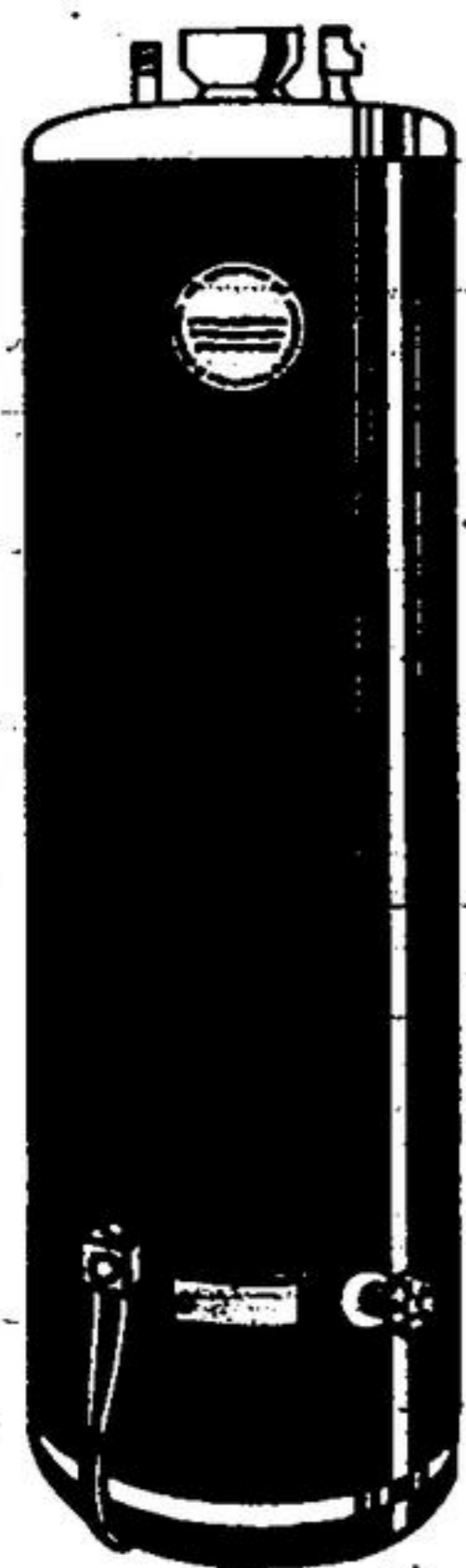

Sgt. Albert E. Turner, 36 Hale Drive, has just retired from the Royal Canadian Air Force. Born in Montreal, he enlisted in Toronto early in 1941 and has served with the RCAF since then. During this time he took several medical courses and travelled in all sec-

tions of the dominion. A trained laboratory technician on retirement, he was supervisor of medical assistants at Downsview RCAF Station.
