

Parent-Teacher Night at Harrison Public School

The parent-teacher night at Harrison public school Monday, March 2nd was attended by 62 per cent of the parents, representing 360 Harrison pupils. The total enrollment at the school is 562. Demonstrations in grades 6 to 8 of Science, Art, Music, Health and Physical training, the subjects taught on a rotary sched-

ule were shown by teachers Logan MacDonald, Bruce Meckison, and Mrs. Florence Cowan and principal Harold Henry. Music provided by the Georgetown boys band was carried over from the public address system from 7.30 to 7.55 and representatives from the home and school association aided the teachers in each room throughout the evening. Refreshments were served at the conclusion by the Home and School members.

Money, Adding Machine Loot in Store Break-In

Strips of adding machine tape found in the town parking lot early Sunday morning were the only traces left by thieves who broke into Buck's Food Store on Mill Street during the week-end and made off with a quantity of money, cigarettes and an adding machine valued at \$250.

The break-in was reported to police early Sunday afternoon by Jack Teeter, 78 Guelph St., of the store staff. Police placed the time of the theft between 10 o'clock Saturday night and 1.30 Sunday morning, when the tape was discovered in the parking lot. Entry was gained to the store through the front door which had been forced with a pinch bar or heavy screw driver. Fifty dollars in bills and ten dollars in change were taken from the till as well as the cigarettes and adding machine. However, police believe the burglars were hurried since they overlooked a few bills on the meat counter at the rear of the store and did not completely empty the register cash drawer.

There was no visible evidence left at the scene and the tenants in the apartment over the store said they heard nothing.

The investigation is being carried out by constables Evan Rollins and Ron Rankine.

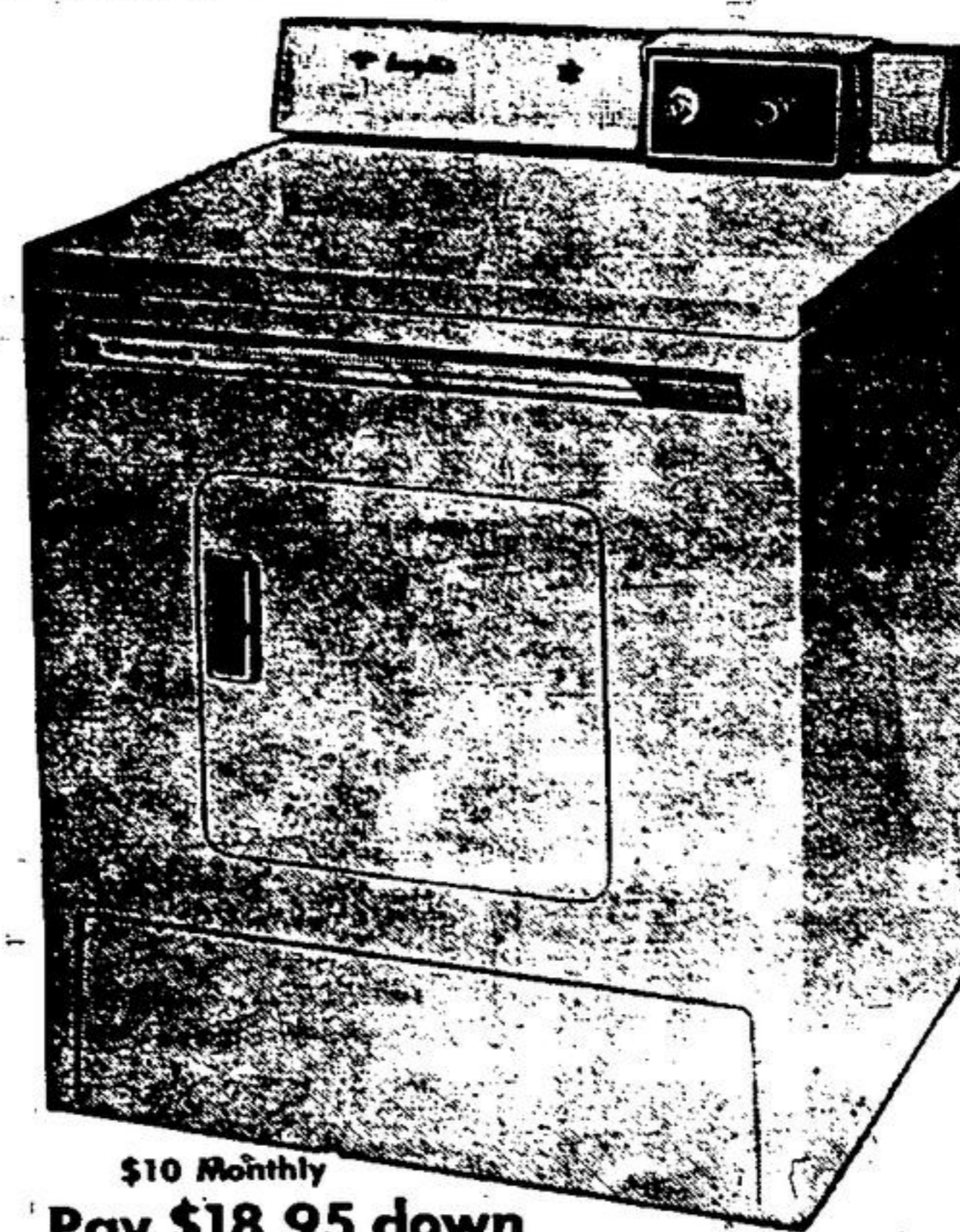
