to clear frozen culverts, was approved after comments by Cr. Hyde in which he objected to the road committee ordering the machine without bringing it to the council first.

Cr. Harrison said that the road committee had been faced with an emergency and had contacted all councillors by phone except Mr. Hyde and had received approval.

Mr. Hyde said he would not vote against the purchase, but that he was against it in principle because he does not think the town should have a machine which is used for a few weeks and sits idle the rest of the year. He criticized grading ice off the roads, and said the road committee is prone to take action every time a ratepayer complains and that costs of winter road maintenance are more than the town can afford.

"If we hadn't graded ice, many of our roads would be closed," said Deputy Reeve Gray. "If we use a machine, which will be used don't have this machine it will cost us much more than \$1,000 in road damage in the spring break-up."

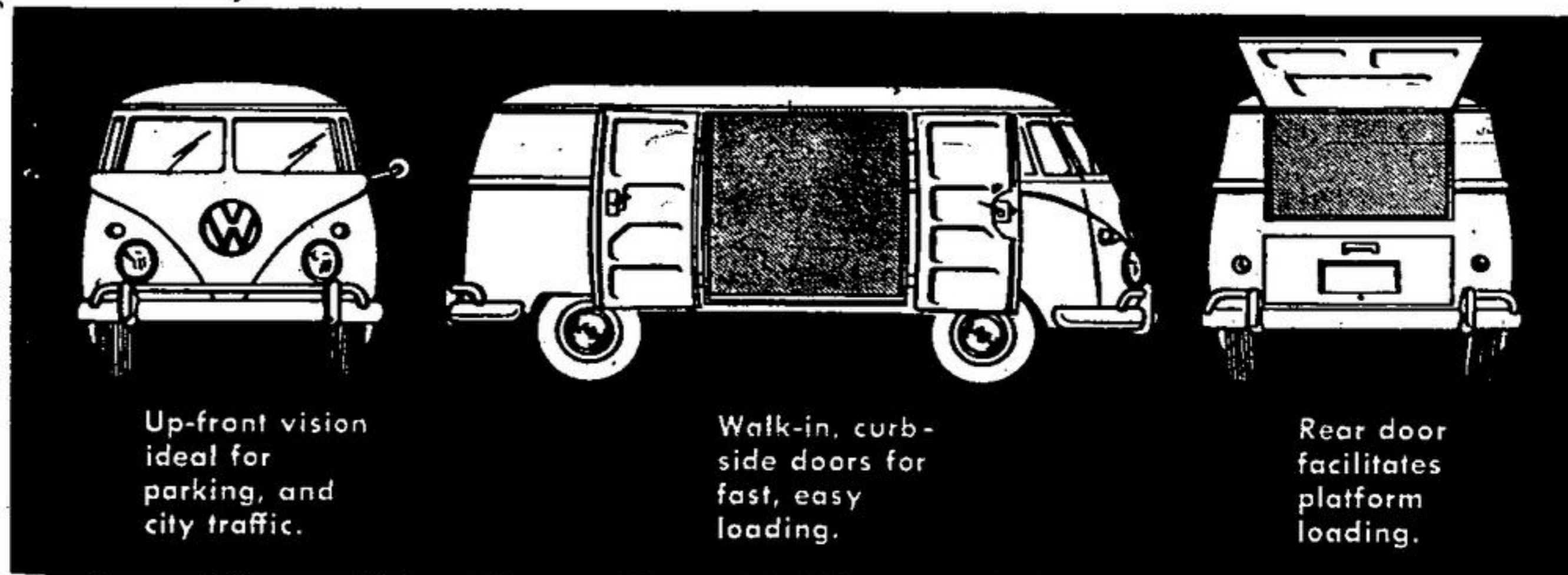
