Women's Institute Summary Day Discusses "Third Meal" Theme

The second annual Summary Day for Halton county Women's Institutes was held Tuesday, March 3rd in Esqueving township hall, Stewarttown. This year the branches have been participating in a course called "The Third Meal," which deals especially with the preparation of good lunches or suppers. Judging from the response shown at Summary Day, it must have been a very successful project.

Last year the Home Economics Service of the Dept. of Agriculture inaugurated a new system of courses whereby Women's Institutes and other organizations could send two of their own members to be instructed at a leader's training school. These leaders then conducted the courses for

a course in Home Furnishings: New Lamps for Old." This year it was the Third Meal which deals with Food and Nutrition.

Badges Presented

Growth of interest in this type of program was indicated by the increase in participations and attendance at Summary Day. Nine Women's Institutes in the county sent representatives to the Training School last November and all completed the course of study although one group was not able to attend Summary Day. The total attendance this year was 80, as compared to last year's 50.

Mrs. Mabel Borgstrom, Home Economist for Halton county, with the Dept. of Agriculture, chaired the Summary Day program on Tuesday afternoon and called on Miss Mary Porteous, instructor for this class, to present badges to the leaders and to comment on exhibits which each group had prepared. These exhibits featured a lunch or supper main dish, accompanied by the recipe, menu, meal pattern and table setting.

Following this Mrs. Gordon MacNab, Summary Day committee chairman, presided over an extremely varied and lively program presented by the participating groups. First on the list was a demonstration "Let's make a Salad" by Mrs. S. Kirkpatrick and Mrs. Crichton of Limehouse, in which the ladies made and displayed a "Banana Split" plate salad.

More Appetizing

This was followed by a skit from Bannockburn entitled "An Aid to Appetites" and describing the way in which one family's menus had been made more appetizing through the mother's participation in "The Third Meal." Mrs. C. Sinclair, Mrs. J. Anthony and Mrs. W. Linham were the actresses, while Mrs. M. Harness introduced the acts.

Hornby Women's Institute made their presentation in the form of a panel discussion by Mrs. R. King, Mrs. L. Sampson, Mrs. R. Wilson, Mrs. J. Wallace and Mrs. W. Coulton on "Cooking Schools—Was Ours a Success?" The consensus seemed to be that there was no question about it!

Another demonstration, this time by Ballinafad members, Mrs. Wm. Kirkwood and Mrs. Lloyd McLean, showed how to prepare a whole-meal "Pick and Choose" salad.

Illustrated Talk

Miss Charlotte Turner and Mrs. R. Irving of Scotch Block presented an illustrated talk, using food models and flannelgraph, on the subject "Planning Meals Ahead of Time."

"Over the Tea Cups" was Dublin's skit, introduced by Mrs. D. Kennedy, with Mrs. D. Moffat, Mrs. N. Elliott and Mrs. J. Dennis discussing the values of participation in a nutrition course. Then a "Marshmallow Pineapple Dessert Salad" was demonstrated by Mrs. D. Murray and Mrs. G. Shering of Norval.

Mountain Union brought the whole program to a rousing conclusion by having all their members join in singing two excellent songs written by their members. One of these, entitled "A Good Third Meal" was prepared especially for this occasion.

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Malton Lay-off May Affect Plans for New Weber School

The cancellation of the CF-105 may have its effect on the plans for Georgetown's fifth public school.

At a regular meeting of the public school board at the Harrison School on Wednesday, March 4th, members expressed concern over the situation which could mean a decrease in the number of rooms proposed if the department sees fit. The re-planning would delay the opening possibly until January, 1960.

The department would probably favour a five room structure, however the board agreed they would rather support the original plan and have some of the rooms vacant for a term than chance being caught short of teaching space in the event that the Malton crisis was remedied.

Though slackening off sharply, the influx of new residents in the Delrex area has not halted entirely, one of the facts the board must be able to support before the department to prove ten rooms necessary.

Tenders for the construction of a ten room school have already been called for March 25th.

Thirty three percent of the enrollment at Harrison are from Avro homes and if a job hunting migration vacates classrooms here the board will probably move the classes out of Wrigglesworth auditorium which was never intended as teaching space.

Harrison principal Harold Henry told the board fifteen new registrations were received in February from the new area behind the Sykes plant making a total of 90 now attending the school from that part of the subdivision. He said the school averages 3 or 4 new registrations per week.

Board chairman Ed Wilson told

the principal to notify him immediately when the trend changes to an abatement.

A 1603 public school enrolment was reported at the meeting with the largest number, 562, at Harrison. Wrigglesworth has 444, Chapel St. 321 and Park 276.

Barrister Tom Van Sicker, 43 Shelley Street was named as the board's appointee to the library board replacing Gordon Tee in mid term. Mr. Tee is leaving town.

Representing the Rotary Club, barrister John Ord, 76 Maple Ave. W., notified the board of the dates for the annual "Show Boat" to be held in Wrigglesworth auditorium. This year the minstrel show will be on two week-ends, April 24th and 25th and May 1st and 2nd.

The duties of attendance officer left open with the death of Mr. William Marshall have been taken up by former attendance officer, Harold Moyer.

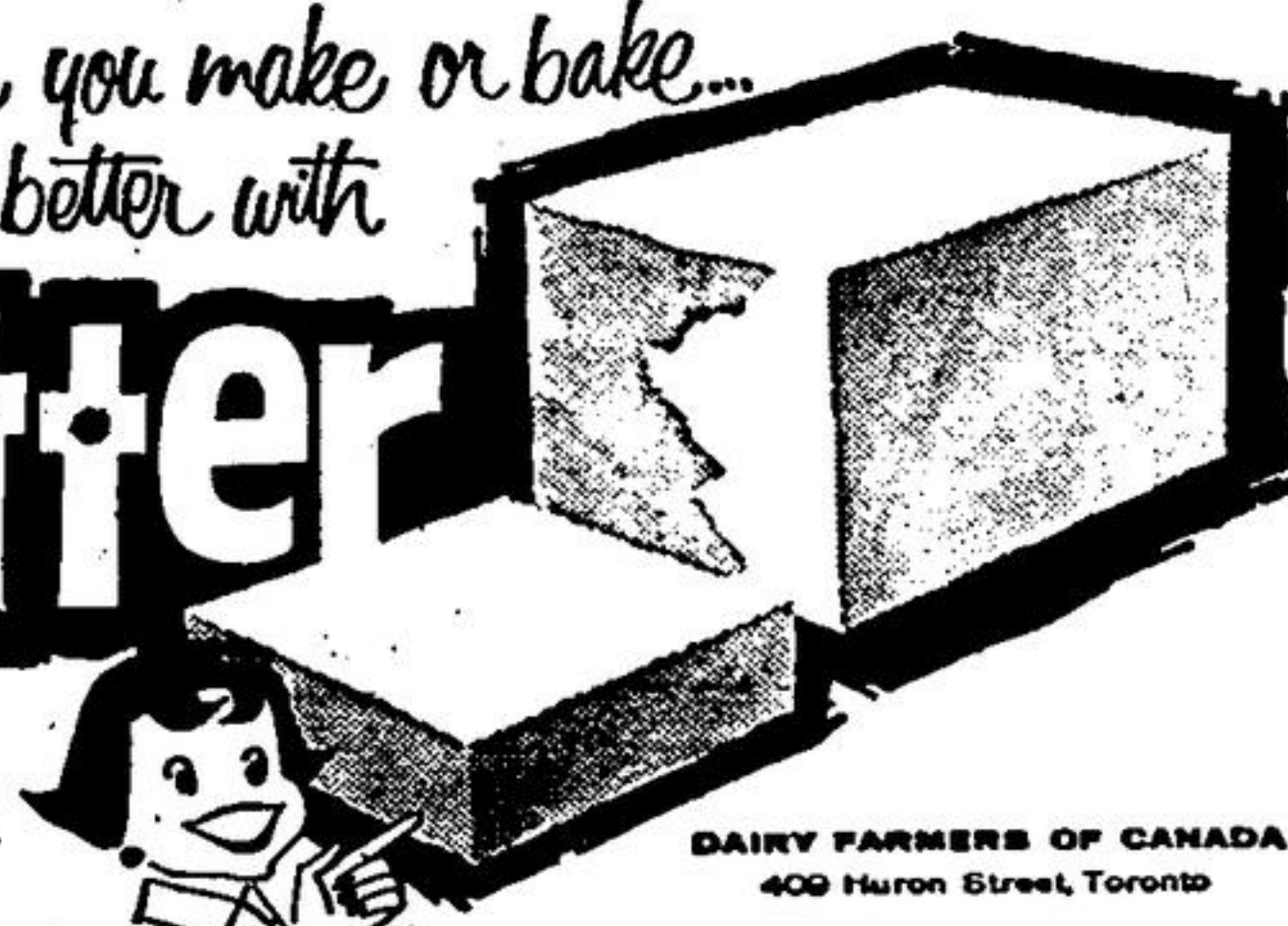
FIREMEN'S AUXILIARY EUCHRE
