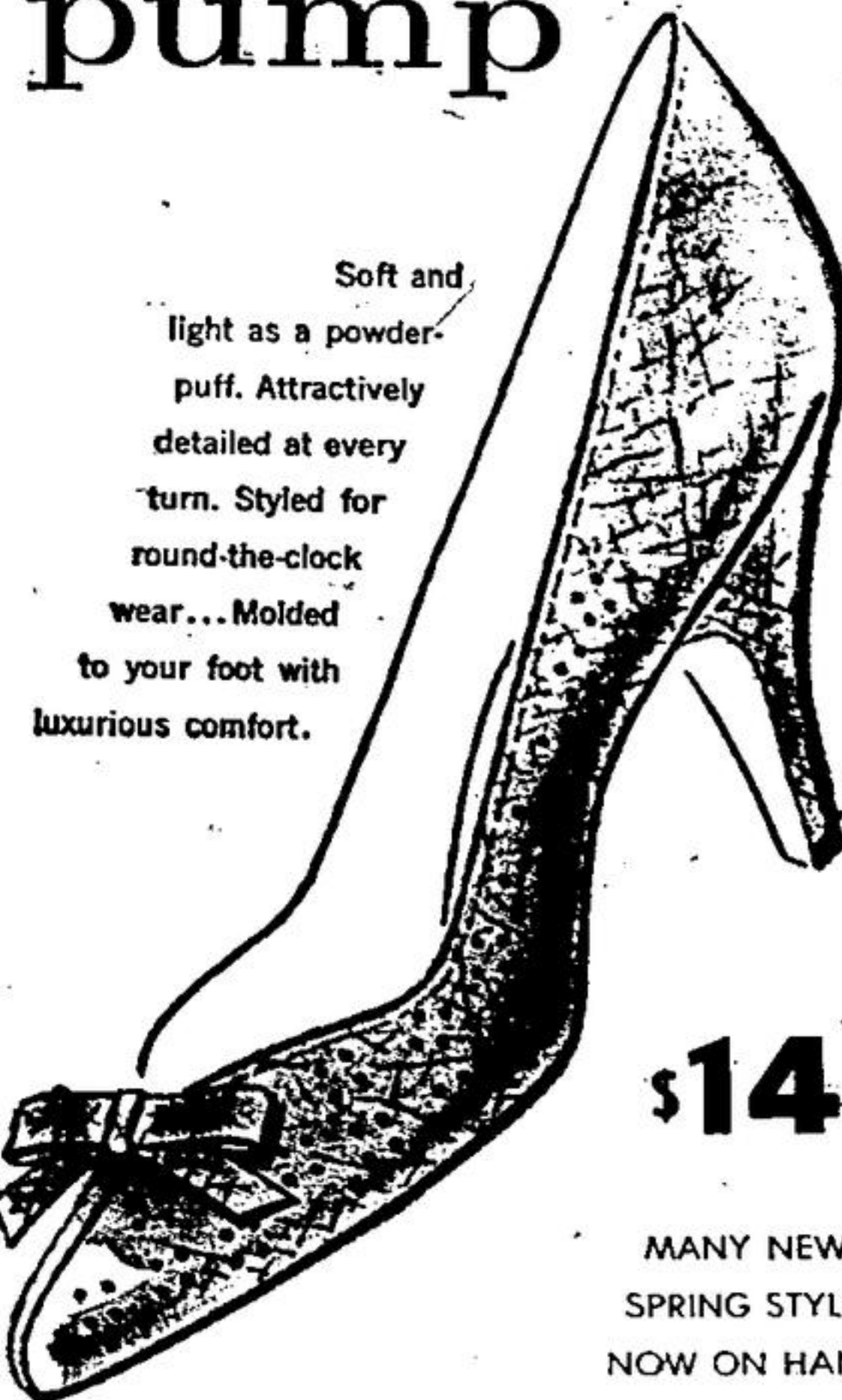

**Two Robberies at
Beaumont Mill
Net Thieves \$1,000**

"Sock thieves" are again plaguing the Beaumont Knitting Co. Ltd. in Glen Williams, and after two recent robberies, the mill owners have decided to engage a night watchman—an expensive, but necessary method of dealing with their troubles.

Last Thursday morning, the discovery was made that a window had been smashed to gain entrance to the finishing room, where \$400 in goods just completed were removed by the robbers. The mill office was also ransacked and a small quantity of cash taken.

A month ago, the warehouse was entered and \$600 worth of socks were stolen. Provincial police have been unsuccessful as yet in locating the criminals.

The incidents recall one of this district's largest robberies, also a double-header, which occurred six years ago. The mill, at that time owned by Arthur Beaumont, which has since been sold to Sam Penrice and Gordon Graham, was robbed twice in a 2-month period. In October, \$4,000 in finished goods was stolen, and in December, \$3,000.

**Collingwood Man Was
Railway Section Foreman**

A CNR section foreman for over 40 years, John Smith, 94, died in Collingwood on March 6th.

A native of Norfolk, England, he was the son of William and Louisa Bickers Smith. He came to Canada as a young man, farmed for awhile, then joined the railway. He was a member of the Independent Order of Foresters and of Collingwood United Church.

His wife, Alice Eleanor Chilvers died in 1930, and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Ewart (Ethel) Hilliard in 1944. On May 2nd, 1931, he married Ellen May Long of Georgetown at Limehouse, who survives. He also leaves a brother Frederick Smith of Norfolk, England; a sister, Mrs. Ernest Nunn, Suffolk County, England; one grandson, John W. Hilliard, Midland; and five great-grandchildren. Mrs. Robert Beaudoin, John Hilliard, Jr., George, Dennis and Patricia Hilliard, all of Midland. Several brothers and sisters predeceased him, one in California and the others in England.

Rev. John E. Hunter, of Trinity United Church conducted the funeral service on March 9th in Collingwood, with interment following in Trinity United Cemetery. Pallbearers were Wallace Campbell and J. W. Leisk, Collingwood; George and Alex Dodsworth, Creemore; Stanley Somerville and Earl Harrison, Orangeville.
