A Stewarttown resident, James Staddon, was bereaved last week when his father, Albert Reginald Staddon of R. R. 1, Sebringville, died on Wednesday, March 17th at Stratford General Hospital. He was in his fifty-seventh year.

Born in Surrey, England, the son of James Staddon and the former Mary Hill, he made Weston his first home in Canada and later lived for ten years in Erin. He had been a resident of R. R. 1, Sebringville for the past five years.

On November 24th, 1928, he married Gladys Gibson at Weston. He was a receiving clerk at Fram of Canada until the time of his illness and was always fond of fishing as a recreation. He was a member of Trinity Anglican Church at Mitchell.

E. Cooley) of Toronto, and Phyllis (Mrs. Fred Loring) Massachusetts, Beverly and Donald Staddon were his only grandchildren.
