Last weekend was the annual meeting of the full executive committee and saw all the provincial officers present. The meeting includes all officers down to and including zone commanders. There were many items of considerable interest brought up, including, God bless you, no less a controversial subject than the Canadian flag issue. This was resolved nicely inasmuch as the meeting saw fit to recognize both the Union Jack and the Red Ensign, at branches discretion.

A new crest has been designed for the Legion by Allan Bideault, the Ottawa expert on Heraldry, and actually it was exceptionally good, but was left over until 1960 so that Ontario will not spend money on crests and find it not ratified by the dominion convention. As we are no longer a part of the BESL, those words are to be deleted from our crest, and the new one had done this, having the lettering changed so that on one side is "Canadian" the other "Candienne" and the bottom having the word "Legion". Evidently a strong objection has been raised by one of the western commands.

Now that we are no longer affiliated with the British Empire Service League, it is felt advisable to have a crest of our own as soon as possible.
