The Secret of Success

He has achieved success who has lived well, laughed often, and loved much; who has gained the respect of intelligent men and the love of little children; who has filled his niche and accomplished his task; who has left the world better than he found it, whether by an improved poppy, a perfect poem, or a rescued soul; who has never lacked appreciation of earth's beauty or failed to express it; who has always looked for the best in others, and given the best he had; whose life was an inspiration, whose memory, a benediction.

Juvenile Delinquency

What causes juvenile delinquency? Lack of parental control is a big contributing factor. The parent who allows his child to wander on the streets at night, or weekends, is as much to blame as his children for the acts they commit. How many parents know where their teenage sons and daughters are at week-ends? How many are given a certain hour when to be in the home? How many enforce the given hour? How many of your children turn over their weekly pay packets, and in return receive their weekly allowance. For sixteen long, hard and lonely years (more in some cases) have you fed, clothed and nursed them in time of sickness—What do you get now? Your son or daughter comes home on payday, tosses you ten, maybe fifteen dollars for washing, ironing, feeding and cleaning up after them. Do you think it's right?

This is why we have juvenile delinquents. Parents who allow their children to become delinquents must be made to realize that they are committing an offence against society, and also against their children. On the child's very first offence, the parents should be present in court and be put on a bond to assure the child's future good behaviour. Then if the child comes up again, the parents would have to face the court, and be liable to punishment, such as a fine. Only by charging parents and children, in this way, can we hope to stamp out the evil.

Highway Traffic Act

Section 10-(1): Whenever on a highway after dusk and before dawn, every motor vehicle shall carry three lighted lamps in a conspicuous position, one on each side of the front, which cast a white light, and one on the back of the vehicle which shall cast from its face a red light only, except in the case of a motorcycle, without a sidecar, which shall carry one at the front and one at the rear, and any lamp so used shall be clearly visible at a distance of at least 500 feet from the front or rear, as the case may be.

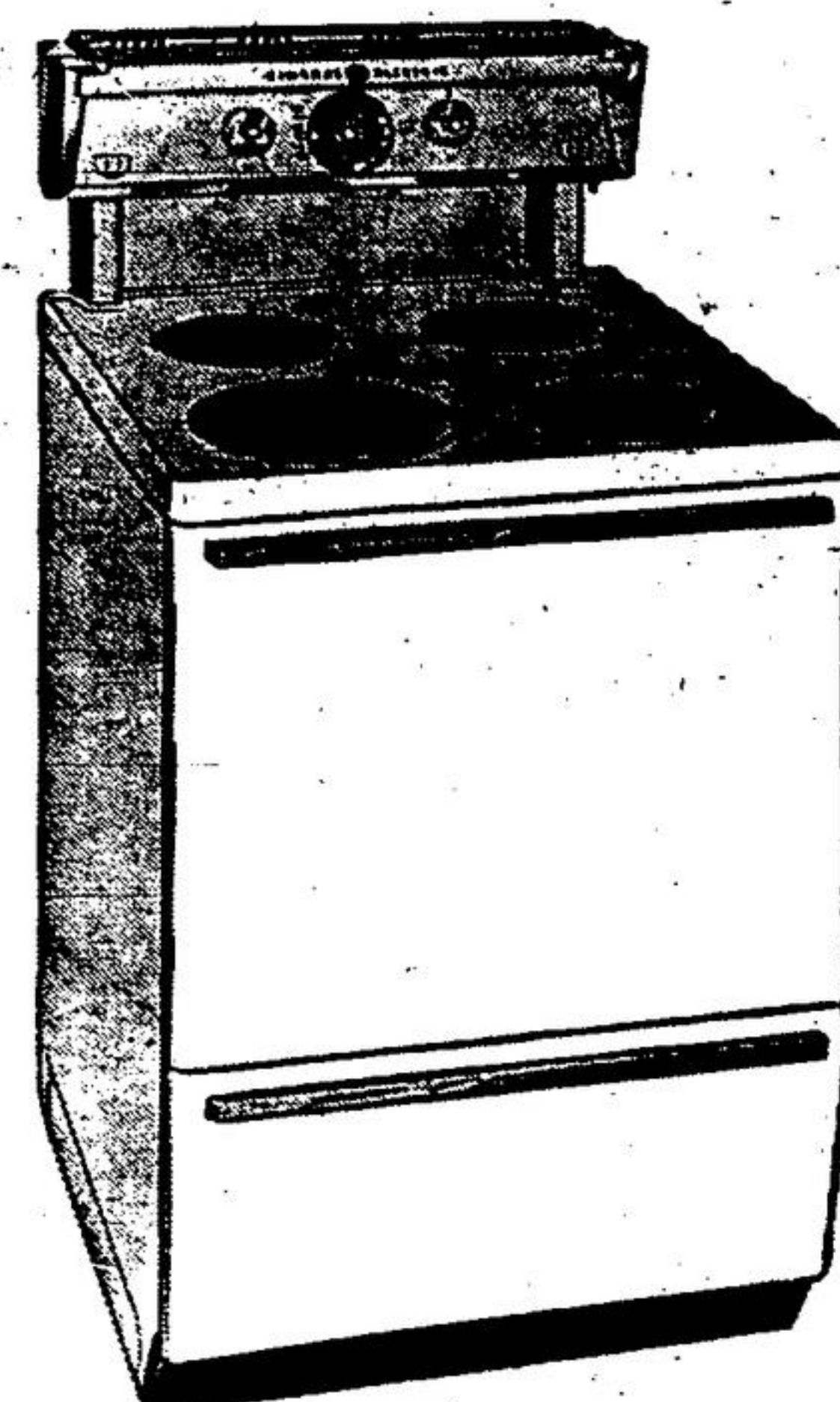
