Mr. Lindsay was born on the seventh line of Erin township, about four miles from where he lives now at R. R. 1, Limehouse, with his wife and daughter Mrs. Morgan Madill and Mr. Madill. He says he keeps limber watering 20 head of cattle every day, feeding over 20 hogs and 120 hens and tending the team of horses. "That's what keeps me active," according to Mr. Lindsay.

There was a family dinner on Sunday, despite the swirling snow outside. His wife, Mr. and Mrs. Madill and their daughter, his son Dave Lindsay and Mrs. Lindsay of Acton, a granddaughter, Mrs. Bob Cunningham and Mr. Cunningham and his only great grandchild, Robert William Cunningham of Streetsville, were present.
"The minute they finished they struck for home," Mr. Lindsay said. "They ran into the hurricane wind of 92 miles an hour. You couldn't see your hand before you. There were some anxious people until they got home."
Another daughter, Mrs. Hattie Price of Campbellville, and her son Bill were unable to be there due to illness.

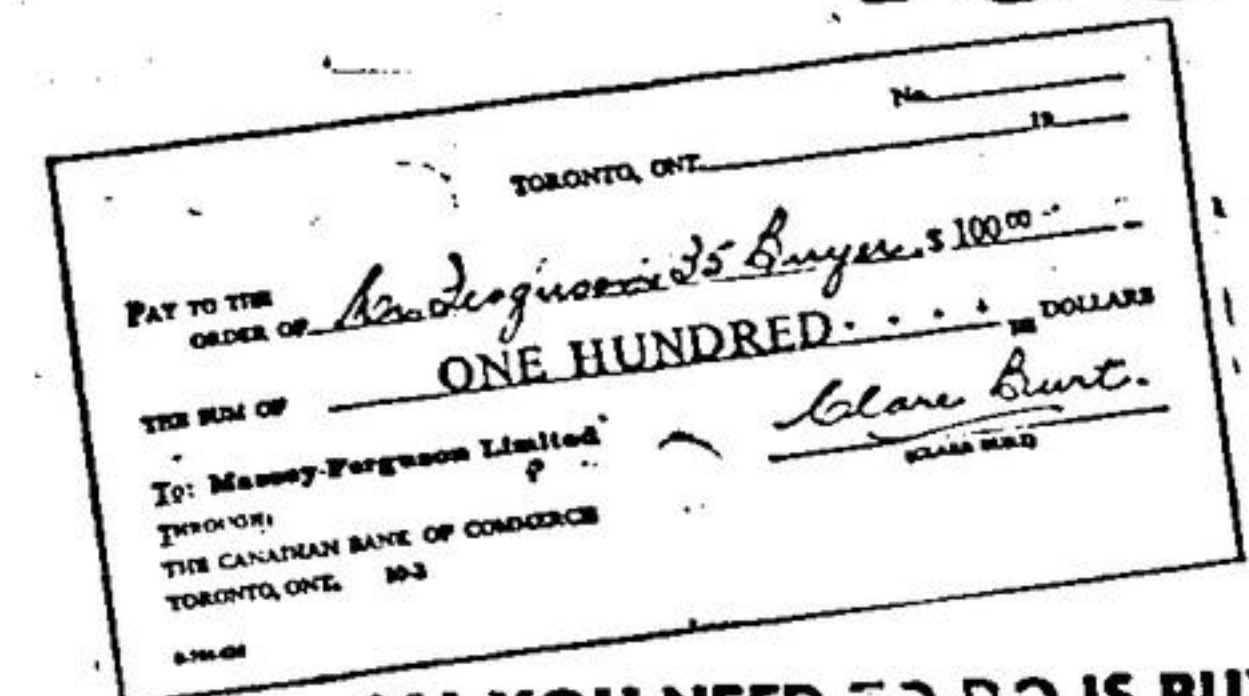

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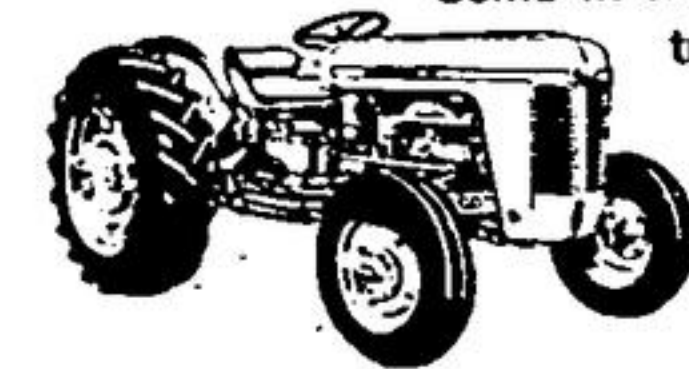


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
