## In Lady Golf Bowling Chumps Capture Title

Mrs. Ross Duncan's Chop Chops were dogged with one of their worst afternoons of the playoffs last Monday when they rolled a three game total of 2867 to kill their chances of catching Eleanor Spitzer's surprising Chumps for the Golf Ladies bowling title.

The Chumps ran up a 3007 total, their second 3000 plus score in succession, to earn the league championship by a margin of 345 pins.

The Squibs, however, cornered the market on alley wizardry when they topped everything with a spectacular 3,109 that lifted them from the depths of the league cellar to third place. The Rockettes carded a creditable 2872 but finished last.

The final tally showed the Chump's reigning with 11,991; Chop Chops second with 11,646; Squibs, captained by Mrs. Len Ward, third with 11,456 and Mrs. Scotty Herkes Rockettes trailing with 11,420.

Mrs. Ken Nash's 665 surpassed all previous playoff triples while Mrs. William McNally's 521 gave her second and identical scores of 519 tied Mrs. Ted Darlington and Eleanor Spitzer for 3rd. Dropped to second by Mrs. Nash's final day tri-count was Mrs. Ron Kitchen with 585 and Mrs. Stan Wade was third with 579.

For the first time, the 1959 directory includes Huttonville, Snelgrove and Victoria as Bell exchanges. Since the publication of the 1958 directory, DDD service has been extended to include major centres like Montreal, New York City and Miami, Florida.

The front cover of this year's directory is unchanged, featuring an artist's sketch of the Peel county court house.

## 4,000 New Phone Books Being Distributed Now

Total circulation of that perennial "best seller", the Brampton telephone directory, will show an increase of more than 3,000 copies over last year.

L. C. Denby, Bell Telephone manager for this territory, announced this week.

Some 27,390 copies of the new directory will be mailed to subscribers in Brampton, Georgetown, Milton, Huttonville, Snelgrove, Victoria and Orangeville next week.

Of the total some 4,000 copies will go to subscribers in Georgetown; 6,500 copies will be distributed in Brampton, and 3,500 in Milton.

The Georgetown circulation figure indicates a slight increase over last year's.

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## Car-Truck Damaged In Norval Curve Crash

### Don Taylor Wins Top Prize in Seed Judging

The annual Junior Farmer Seed Judging Competition was held on April 2nd, under the sponsorship of the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association.

Donald Taylor, Burlington, was awarded the Royal Bank of Canada Trophy for the high contestant; and the Bank of Montreal Trophy for the coach of the winning team, in the Seed Judging.

Contestants judged and gave reasons on classes of oats, wheat, barley, red clover, alfalfa and identified forage plants, weeds — and judged one class of hay. The competition was held under the direction of J. Allen Francis, Agricultural Representative, and A. R. Coulter, chairman, Halton 4-H Leaders' Council; and Add Woodley, past chairman.

Official judges were J. E. Whitlock, J. W. McCullough, Agric. Rep. for Peel County; Ross Milne, Agricultural Engineering Fieldman; Morris Freeman, Assistant Agric. Rep. for Wentworth County, and Wm. Taylor, Fieldman with Field Crops Branch, Ontario Dept. of Agriculture.
