Governor-General to Visit Georgetown on May 14th

Georgetown will have a distinguished visitor on Thursday, May 14th when the Governor-General, Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey will pay an official visit to the town.

A letter to Mayor Armstrong last week gave the information that the Governor General plans to be in town from 4.30 to 5.00 p.m. that day, and he expressed particular interest in meeting members of the town council and as many school children as possible. He will arrive by special train.

Council discussed a suitable welcome at Monday's council meeting which would include congregating children at a central location, veterans at the cenotaph where a wreath would be laid, and a motor route which would allow Mr. Massey to see as much of the town as possible while conforming to his limited time schedule.

It is probable that a cavalcade of cars will proceed down Queen St. Semblant on the lawn of St. George's Church where a platform and children will possibly be as well as erected and an official welcome extended by the mayor. The party would then proceed to the cenotaph where veterans would be assembled, and then down the Main Street and back to the CNR station. The Lorne Scout Regiment is being contacted for a guard of honour and bands will also be arranged.

Details have been left to Cr. Fred Harrison's property committee which is suggesting that householders and merchants may wish to decorate their homes for the occasion. Final route plans will be made public as soon as possible, Mr. Harrison said.

District Governor Here For Lions Anniversary

District Governor Russell Vickers of Burlington brought congratulations from Lions International and extended his own congratulations to the local Lions on the occasion of their 28th anniversary when he spoke to the club at their dinner meeting in the Legion Hall on Tuesday, April 7th.

Introduced by the president, Dick Miller, district governor Vickers outlined the details of the prospective International convention in Toronto in 1962 and informed the members that the idea was under discussion at present at a special meeting now being held in Sweden. He gave a complete resume of the various officers of Lions International in Chicago, their help and each officer's job. He stressed the duty of Lions to spread Lionism, pointing out the slogan of the Lions of South Africa, "service of self wherever needed" and urging local Lions to remember it as they go about building the world they want, depending on the job they do and the projects they support in the community.

Est. Ted Scott, traffic safety officer for the Georgetown police department was also a guest at the meeting and showed a film on the demerit point system in effect in Manitoba and now in Ontario. CAR, CHIMNEY BLAZE CALL FIREMEN TWICE

Minor damage to a car owned by Elmer Burt, resulted early Sunday morning when it burst into flames in front of the Co-Op building after thieves had apparently tried to make off with it from the Herkes lot.

Police discovered the car opposite the Co-Op while making a routine check and after notifying the owner found it had been taken from the Herkes lot. The police figured the motor had quit on the would-be-car thieves as they tried to make their getaway up the Guelph Street hill and they had backed it down onto the Co-Op property.

Est. Ted Scott was attempting to start the car when the motor burst into flames. He immediately turned in the call to the fire department.

No damage resulted from a chimney fire on Saturday afternoon at 16 Queen St. where pipes from a coal stove in a downstairs apartment joined pipes from an oil space heater, upstairs, resulting in sufficient heat to ignite soot lining the chimney. Shortly after the call was turned in firemen were at the scene and killed the blaze by knocking the burning substance from the walls of the chimney with a chain. The fire was spotted at about 4 p.m.

The first grass fire of the season occurred yesterday morning at 10.40 when a box of paper being burned by Denny Wright behind his house at 16 John St. E., touched off the dry grass. Firemen beat off the flames heading for a couple of CNR sheds and then burned off the grass to the tracks.

Sundridge Eliminated In March to Crown

Georgetown Hunters definitely and Thorold probably will be the hopefuls when the OHA Intermediate B provincials go up for grabs this year.

The Hunters Realtors made sure of their bid for the Ontario title Monday night when they tripped up a determined Sundridge Beaver club 5-4 to take their best of seven semi-final four games to one.

The one thousand plus paying customers who witnessed Monday's cliff-hanger saw the Hunters come off the floor in the third frame with a dramatic surge that left nervous types limp.

Down four goals to three early in the period, George Grassy started Dave Irons away on the rush that knotted it at 4-4, and tension reigned like a balloon on the point of bursting until 14:43 when

lumber.

In the second frame George Grassy and Boyer exchanged round-house rights and picked up fighting majors.

Dixon, Chard and Junior Beaumont scored in the first two periods for Georgetown, Mike Wood, Rosie Johnstone, Tony Odrowski, and Harold Hill picked openings for Sundridge. Of the 17 penalties, Sundridge drew 9.

Bill Hunter's promise of steaks for the goal-getters and for Rhodes if he managed a shut-out was the incentive behind Georgetown's 4-0 win over the Beavers on their home ice Saturday night. Including in the payoff at Pete's Restaurant, Huntsville, after the white wash were Junior Beaumont (2), Jamie Cunningham, George Grassy and of course, Jack "Rabbit" Rhodes.
