**GEORGETOWN RESTRICTIONS**

**SALE and DISCHARGE  
OF FIREWORKS**

PLEASE NOTE THAT BY-LAW 58-14 PASSED AT THE MAY 5th, 1958, GEORGETOWN COUNCIL MEETING, ESTABLISHES THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS CONCERNING FIREWORKS.

1. Fireworks can be sold in Georgetown only on the 7 days prior to and including the day fixed for the Victoria Day celebration — and none may be sold to anyone under the age of 16.
2. No fireworks can be discharged on any day except Victoria Day.
3. The fire chief may issue a permit for special displays by organizations under supervision of a properly qualified person. Written application should be made to the fire chief at least one week in advance of event.
4. A person convicted of breaking the by-law is liable to a fine up to \$50 plus costs.

Residents are asked to comply with this by-law which has been passed to minimize the chance of accident and fire which indiscriminate use of fireworks makes possible.

**New Books Arrive for  
Local Library Week**

Sponsored by the Canadian Librarians' Association, the Book Publishers' Association and La Société des Éditeurs Canadiens des Livres Français, Canadian Library Week will be celebrated across the country from April 12th to April 18th. It is devoted to the importance of reading in Canadian life and to the importance of libraries of all kinds — public, school, university, and special libraries and libraries maintained by individuals in their own homes.

The Canadian Library Week Council has been founded to promote Canadian Library Week and is composed of outstanding citizens from many fields of endeavour. The Council looks to the social and cultural implications of reading as distinct from the professional and commercial problems of librarians and publishers.

It is hoped to attract public attention to books and libraries and to promote reading as a pleasant and worthwhile aspect of Canadian life.

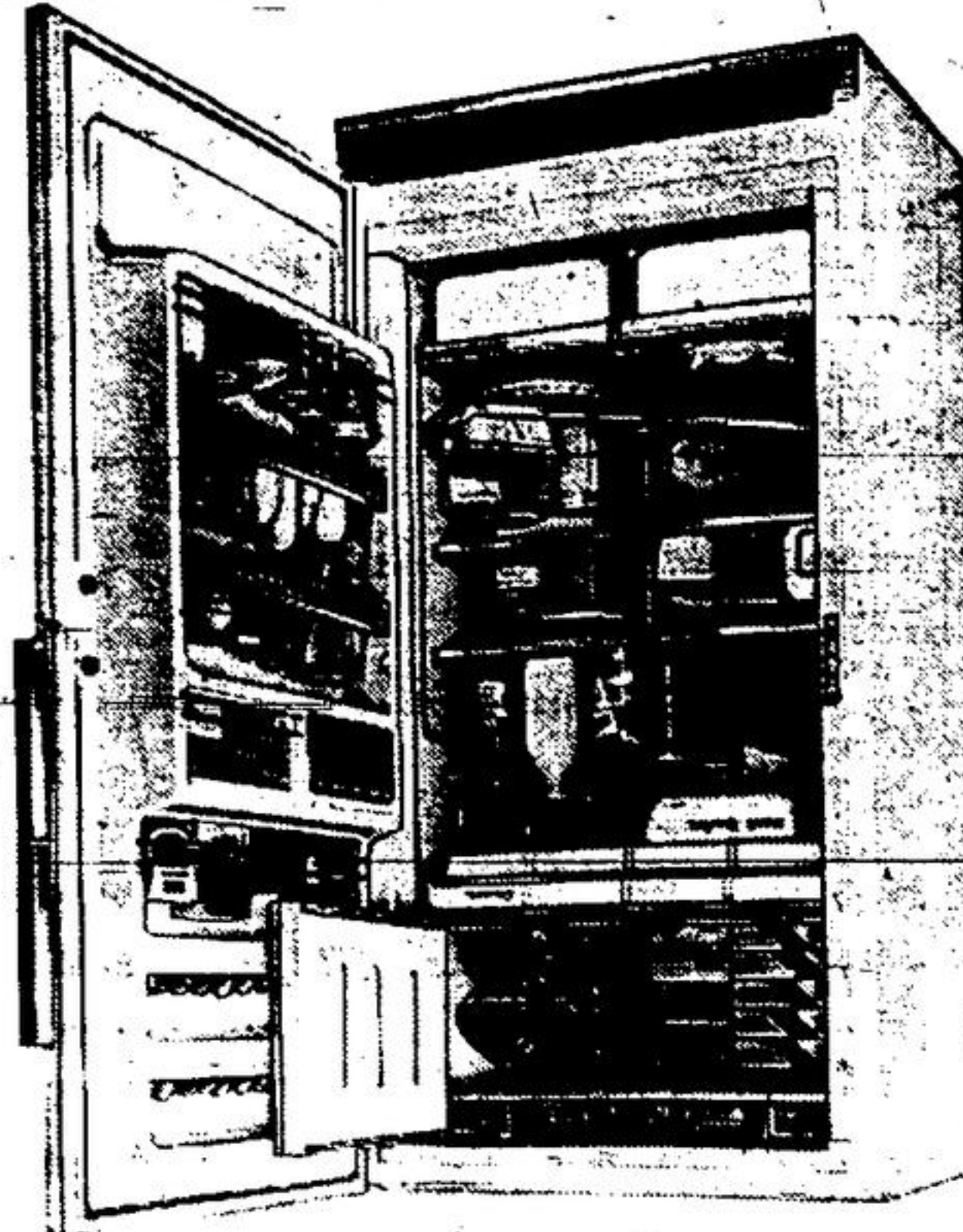

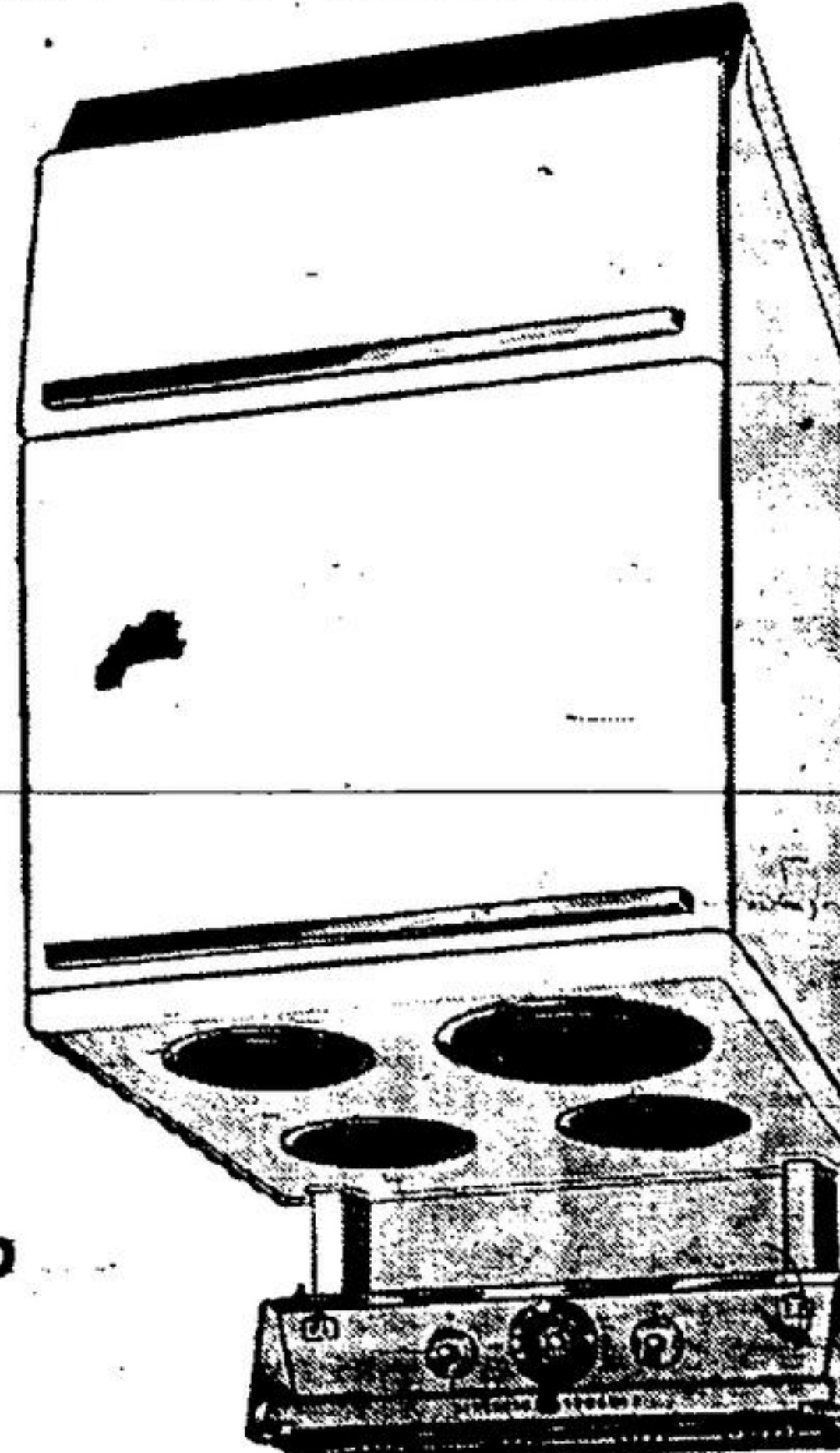
