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## CONSTRUCTION TO START SOON ON HALTON CENTENNIAL MANOR ADDITION



Halton Centennial Manor Addition

The contract for construction of additional units to Halton Centennial Manor, a home for the aged on Highway 25 on the outskirts of Milton, Ontario, was awarded to Dell Construction Company Limited of Milton, for a total cost of \$920,000.

Designed by Shore & Moffat, Toronto architects, the addition will increase from 98 to 233 the number of beds for the aged at the Manor.

In addition, the new construction will incorporate an auditorium and a circular chapel. Expansion of the laundry and kitchen facilities, along with the heating plant, also is planned.

Cost of the new dwelling and service areas, is being met

jointly by the County of Halton and the Province of Ontario.

Shore & Moffat said that the additional units had been designed for low-cost maintenance and that the exterior materials of the new quarters will match those of the existing buildings, which were erected in 1950.

Of one-storey construction, the buildings will be surrounded by comprehensive landscaped gardens so that the senior citizens will feel more at home.

The new quarters will include a 57-bed care wing, a 46-bed special care wing, an additional 20 beds for normal care men, and facilities for 12 married couples.

## Curlers Approve Plans for New Rink at Golf Club

A letter from the Board of Parks Management notifying the Georgetown Curling Club that no allowance has been made for curling time in next year's arena schedule has simplified North Halton Golf and Country Club's investigation into the feasibility of constructing a four and possibly six sheet curling centre there this year.

At a meeting of the curling club in the North Halton club house on Tuesday, March 24th, almost 100 per cent in a standing vote signified their desire to swing to the new club if North Halton decides to proceed with their plan and it appears they will. The new club's membership committee under Murt Allison has set at 235 the number of signatures required to give the much discussed proposal the green light and to date 166 commitments have been received.

The tentative membership is rapidly growing and will probably surpass the minimum before the next meeting of the golf club shareholders sometime next month. The old club agreed that all their equipment would be turned over to the new club without charge.

In a bulletin prepared by a committee of golf club shareholders at the first of the year, the total cost of the new rink was estimated at in the neighbourhood of \$85,000 to \$70,000.

The Board of Parks' reason for ousting the curling club from their regular Wednesday and Thursday night spots next year was overcrowding during the periods set aside for public skating. Ice skating time during the 1959-60 season has been expanded considerably to handle the congestion here which has been building up since the town started to subdivide.

#### Organize Forage Club For Acton 4-Hers

A second Forage Club was organized in Halton County during the past week, when the Acton 4-H Forage club held its organization meeting on Thursday, April 9th.

The meeting was under the chairmanship of Nino Braida, club leader for the Acton 4-H Forage Club, and assistant club leaders, Eyle Somerville and Calvin Aitken.

This is the 2nd year for the Forage Club in Acton. Fifteen members are enrolled, including seven new members. The influx of new members is a direct result of the success of last year's programme.

As a club project all club members will seed down one acre of a hay-pasture mixture of Registered and Certified forage seeds. The mixture being used is:

8 lbs of Vernal Alfalfa; 2 lbs of La Salle Red Clover; 4 lbs. of Climax Timothy; 6 lbs. of Lincoln Brome sown per acre. J. A. Francis, agricultural representative, outlined the club programme and conducted the election of officers. The officers elected were as follows:

President, Don Swackhamer; vice president, Russell Murray; secretary, Wm. Rosvaldson; press reporter, James Aitken.
